HB 2294 (Chapter 292): yielding to emergency vehicle; penalties

Modifies the civil penalty for individuals who fail to yield the right-of-way or proceed with caution when approaching a stationary vehicle that displays warning lights as follows: 1) \$275 for the first violation; 2) \$500 for a second violation if the violation occurs within a five-year period; and 3) \$1,000 for a third or subsequent violation if the violation occurs within a five-year period.

HB 2295 (Chapter 336): law enforcement officers; database; rules

Mandates a prosecuting agency send written notice to a law enforcement officer's current or last known employment address at least 10 days, or as soon as practicable, before a prosecuting agency considers placing the officer's name in the rule 15.1 database.

HB 2297 (Chapter 193): military leaves of absence; duration

Modifies the calculation of military leave of absence hours that public employees can receive to up to three times the average regularly scheduled work hours in a weekly work period each year and up to six times the average regularly scheduled work hours in a weekly work period in any two consecutive years.

HB 2310 (Chapter 261): NOW: executive orders; review; attorney general

Requires the Executive Director of Legislative Council to review presidential executive orders if requested by a legislator. Allows a legislator to recommend the Attorney General review an order to determine the order's legality.

HB 2460 (Chapter 236): detention officers; arrest warrant; custody

Allows a detention officer to arrest a person pursuant to an existing warrant if the person is: 1) already incarcerated in or surrenders to a jail facility where the officer is employed; 2) at a hospital where the officer is assigned and the person being arrested is under supervision or custody while in the hospital; 3) at a superior, justice or municipal court where the officer is assigned; or 4) within a jail facility as a visitor and the person is found to have an outstanding warrant.

HB 2462 (Chapter 338): civilian review board members; training

Establishes requirements for a person to become a member of a civilian review board.

HB 2542 (Chapter 223): veteran suicides; annual report

Requires the annual report on veteran suicides to include data for a nonprofit veterans' service organization.

HB 2550 (Chapter 423): complaints against peace officers; notification

Requires a law enforcement agency to provide a person making a complaint with a notice prior to accepting the complaint.

HB 2567 (Chapter 322): peace officers; investigator membership requirements

Outlines requirements for a government committee, board or entity to investigate law enforcement officer's misconduct.

HB 2763 (Chapter 369): county officials; practice of law

Allows sheriffs' deputies to practice law or form a partnership with an attorney-at-law.

HJR 2001 (Chapter 203): private property; sale; veterans administration

States that Arizona consents to the sale of certain land to the United States for use by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. Provides a legal description of the parcels of land being sold.

SB 1354 (Chapter 246): rate structure; hospital services; prisoners

Enables the Arizona Department of Corrections to establish an alternative reimbursement rate that does not exceed 120% of the current Medicare rate for inpatient and outpatient hospital services that are provided in fully locked unit settings.

SB 1396 (Chapter 249): NOW: CORP; survivor benefits

Entitles the surviving spouse of a deceased member of the Corrections Officer Retirement Plan to four-fifths of what the deceased member's pension would have been on the date of death had the member been retired, if it is greater than the current entitlement.

SB 1443 (Chapter 70): military family relief fund

Allows service members who meet modified statutory requirements be eligible for assistance in the Pre-9/11 and Post-9/11 Veterans Subaccounts. Requires the assistance to be in a financial need as a result of the member's military service. Permits the ADVS Director to allocate up to 10%, rather than 5%, of the donations received for the actual reasonable costs of administering the Subaccounts and financial assistance program.

SB 1451 (Chapter 229): workers' compensation; rates; firefighters; cancer

Extends presumptive occupational diseases to fire investigators. Adds two cancers to the list of presumptive occupational diseases for firefighters and fire investigators. Allows insurers to file one uniform percentage deviation associated with firefighters and fire investigators.

SB 1832/HB 2904 (Chapter 385): restricted license; DUI; suspension.

Modifies requirements relating to restricted driver licenses and certified reports issued for an arrest of driving under the influence. Requires traffic survival school instruction courses to: 1) include information related to aggressive driving; and 2) be offered and completed in person unless the Governor declares a state of emergency.

SB 1849/HB 2911 (Chapter 400): prisoners; training; individual certificates.

Allows a prisoner to receive an individual certificate if they successfully complete a training program to work in a specific field or trade. Makes various changes to health and medical services offered to female inmates.
