AMENDING SECTION 32-3251, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING SECTION 32-3253, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY LAWS 2012, CHAPTER 321, SECTION 70; AMENDING SECTION 32-3253, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY LAWS 2013, CHAPTER 242, SECTION 3; AMENDING TITLE 32, CHAPTER 33, ARTICLE 1, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTION 32-3256; AMENDING SECTION 32-3261, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS ADDED BY LAWS 2013, CHAPTER 242, SECTION 7; AMENDING SECTIONS 32-3274 AND 32-3281, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING SECTION 32-3311, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY LAWS 2013, CHAPTER 242, SECTION 20; AMENDING SECTION 32-3321, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY LAWS 2013, CHAPTER 242, SECTION 21; RELATING TO THE BOARD OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH EXAMINERS.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:

2 Section 1. Section 32-3251, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to
3 read:

4 32-3251. Definitions

5 In this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:

6 1. "Board" means the board of behavioral health examiners.

7 2. "Client" means a patient who receives behavioral health services
8 from a person licensed pursuant to this chapter.

9 3. "Direct client contact" means, beginning November 1, 2015, the
10 performance of therapeutic or clinical functions related to the applicant's
11 professional practice level of psychotherapy that includes diagnosis,
12 assessment and treatment and that may include psychoeducation for mental,
13 emotional and behavioral disorders based primarily on verbal or nonverbal
14 communications and intervention with, and in the presence of, one or more
15 clients.

16 4. "Equivalent" means comparable in content and quality but not
17 identical.

18 5. "Indirect client service" means, beginning November 1, 2015,
19 training for, and the performance of, functions of an applicant's
20 professional practice level in preparation for or on behalf of a client for
21 whom direct client contact functions are also performed, including case
22 consultation and receipt of clinical supervision. Indirect client service
23 does not include the provision of psychoeducation.

24 6. "Letter of concern" means a nondisciplinary written document sent
25 by the board to notify a licensee that, while there is insufficient evidence
26 to support disciplinary action, the board believes that continuation of the
27 activities that led to the investigation may result in further board action
28 against the licensee.

29 7. "Licensee" means a person who is licensed pursuant to this chapter.

30 8. "Practice of behavioral health" means the practice of marriage and
31 family therapy, professional counseling, social work and substance abuse
32 counseling pursuant to this chapter.

33 9. "Practice of marriage and family therapy" means the professional
34 application of family systems theories, principles and techniques to treat
35 interpersonal relationship issues and nervous, mental and emotional disorders
36 that are cognitive, affective or behavioral. The practice of marriage and
37 family therapy includes:

38 (a) Assessment, appraisal and diagnosis.

39 (b) The use of psychotherapy for the purpose of evaluation, diagnosis
40 and treatment of individuals, couples, families and groups.

41 10. "Practice of professional counseling" means the professional
42 application of mental health, psychological and human development theories,
43 principles and techniques to:

44 (a) Facilitate human development and adjustment throughout the human
45 life span.

- 1 (b) Assess and facilitate career development.
2 (c) Treat interpersonal relationship issues and nervous, mental and
3 emotional disorders that are cognitive, affective or behavioral.
4 (d) Manage symptoms of mental illness.
5 (e) Assess, appraise, evaluate, diagnose and treat individuals,
6 couples, families and groups through the use of psychotherapy.
- 7 11. "Practice of social work" means the professional application of
8 social work theories, principles, methods and techniques to:
9 (a) Treat mental, behavioral and emotional disorders.
10 (b) Assist individuals, families, groups and communities to enhance or
11 restore the ability to function physically, socially, emotionally, mentally
12 and economically.
13 (c) Assess, appraise, diagnose, evaluate and treat individuals,
14 couples, families and groups through the use of psychotherapy.
- 15 12. "Practice of substance abuse counseling" means the professional
16 application of general counseling theories, principles and techniques as
17 specifically adapted, based on research and clinical experience, to the
18 specialized needs and characteristics of persons who are experiencing
19 substance abuse, chemical dependency and related problems and to the families
20 of those persons. The practice of substance abuse counseling includes the
21 following as they relate to substance abuse and chemical dependency issues:
22 (a) Assessment, appraisal and diagnosis.
23 (b) The use of psychotherapy for the purpose of evaluation, diagnosis
24 and treatment of individuals, couples, families and groups.
- 25 13. "Psychoeducation" means the education of a client as part of a
26 treatment process that provides the client with information regarding mental
27 health, emotional disorders or behavioral health.
- 28 14. "Psychotherapy" means a variety of treatment methods developing out
29 of generally accepted theories about human behavior and development.
- 30 15. "TELEPRACTICE" MEANS PROVIDING BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES THROUGH
31 INTERACTIVE AUDIO, VIDEO OR ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION THAT OCCURS BETWEEN THE
32 BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROFESSIONAL AND THE CLIENT, INCLUDING ANY ELECTRONIC
33 COMMUNICATION FOR EVALUATION, DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT, INCLUDING DISTANCE
34 COUNSELING, IN A SECURE PLATFORM, AND THAT MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF
35 TELEMEDICINE PURSUANT TO SECTION 36-3602.
- 36 ~~15-~~ 16. "Unprofessional conduct" includes the following, whether
37 occurring in this state or elsewhere:
38 (a) Conviction of a felony. Conviction by a court of competent
39 jurisdiction or a plea of no contest is conclusive evidence of the
40 conviction.
41 (b) Use of fraud or deceit in connection with rendering services as a
42 licensee or in establishing qualifications pursuant to this chapter.
43 (c) Any oral or written misrepresentation of a fact by an applicant or
44 licensee:

- 1 (i) To secure or attempt to secure the issuance or renewal of a
2 license.
- 3 (ii) In any statements provided during an investigation or
4 disciplinary proceeding by the board.
- 5 (iii) Regarding the licensee's skills or the value of any treatment
6 provided or to be provided.
- 7 (d) Any false, fraudulent or deceptive statement connected with the
8 practice of behavioral health, including false or misleading advertising by
9 the licensee or the licensee's staff or a representative compensated by the
10 licensee.
- 11 (e) Securing or attempting to secure the issuance or renewal of a
12 license by knowingly taking advantage of the mistake of another person or the
13 board.
- 14 (f) Active habitual intemperance in the use of alcohol or active
15 habitual substance abuse.
- 16 (g) Using a controlled substance that is not prescribed for use during
17 a prescribed course of treatment.
- 18 (h) Obtaining a fee by fraud, deceit or misrepresentation.
- 19 (i) Aiding or abetting a person who is not licensed pursuant to this
20 chapter to purport to be a licensed behavioral health professional in this
21 state.
- 22 (j) Conduct that the board determines is gross negligence or repeated
23 negligence in the licensee's profession.
- 24 (k) Any conduct or practice that is contrary to recognized standards
25 of ethics in the behavioral health profession or that constitutes a danger to
26 the health, welfare or safety of a client.
- 27 (l) Any conduct, practice or condition that impairs the ability of the
28 licensee to safely and competently practice the licensee's profession.
- 29 (m) Engaging or offering to engage as a licensee in activities that
30 are not congruent with the licensee's professional education, training or
31 experience.
- 32 (n) Failing to comply with or violating, attempting to violate or
33 assisting in or abetting the violation of any provision of this chapter, any
34 rule adopted pursuant to this chapter, any lawful order of the board, or any
35 formal order, consent agreement, term of probation or stipulated agreement
36 issued under this chapter.
- 37 (o) Failing to furnish information within a specified time to the
38 board or its investigators or representatives if legally requested by the
39 board.
- 40 (p) Failing to conform to minimum practice standards as developed by
41 the board.
- 42 (q) Failing or refusing to maintain adequate records of behavioral
43 health services provided to a client.

1 (r) Providing behavioral health services that are clinically
2 unjustified or unsafe or otherwise engaging in activities as a licensee that
3 are unprofessional by current standards of practice.

4 (s) Terminating behavioral health services to a client without making
5 an appropriate referral for continuation of care for the client if continuing
6 behavioral health services are indicated.

7 (t) Disclosing a professional confidence or privileged communication
8 except as may otherwise be required by law or permitted by a valid written
9 release.

10 (u) Failing to allow the board or its investigators on demand to
11 examine and have access to documents, reports and records in any format
12 maintained by the licensee that relate to the licensee's practice of
13 behavioral health.

14 (v) Any sexual conduct between a licensee and a client or former
15 client.

16 (w) Providing behavioral health services to any person with whom the
17 licensee has had sexual contact.

18 (x) Exploiting a client, former client or supervisee. For the
19 purposes of this subdivision, "exploiting" means taking advantage of a
20 professional relationship with a client, former client or supervisee for the
21 benefit or profit of the licensee.

22 (y) Engaging in a dual relationship with a client that could impair
23 the licensee's objectivity or professional judgment or create a risk of harm
24 to the client. For the purposes of this subdivision, "dual relationship"
25 means a licensee simultaneously engages in both a professional and
26 nonprofessional relationship with a client that is avoidable and not
27 incidental.

28 (z) Engaging in physical contact between a licensee and a client if
29 there is a reasonable possibility of physical or psychological harm to the
30 client as a result of that contact.

31 (aa) Sexually harassing a client, former client, research subject,
32 supervisee or coworker. For the purposes of this subdivision, "sexually
33 harassing" includes sexual advances, sexual solicitation, requests for sexual
34 favors, unwelcome comments or gestures or any other verbal or physical
35 conduct of a sexual nature.

36 (bb) Harassing, exploiting or retaliating against a client, former
37 client, research subject, supervisee, coworker or witness or a complainant in
38 a disciplinary investigation or proceeding involving a licensee.

39 (cc) Failing to take reasonable steps to inform potential victims and
40 appropriate authorities if the licensee becomes aware during the course of
41 providing or supervising behavioral health services that a client's condition
42 indicates a clear and imminent danger to the client or others.

43 (dd) Failing to comply with the laws of the appropriate licensing or
44 credentialing authority to provide behavioral health services by electronic

1 means in all governmental jurisdictions where the client receiving these
2 services resides.

3 (ee) Giving or receiving a payment, kickback, rebate, bonus or other
4 remuneration for a referral.

5 (ff) Failing to report in writing to the board information that would
6 cause a reasonable licensee to believe that another licensee is guilty of
7 unprofessional conduct or is physically or mentally unable to provide
8 behavioral health services competently or safely. This duty does not extend
9 to information provided by a licensee that is protected by the behavioral
10 health professional-client privilege unless the information indicates a clear
11 and imminent danger to the client or others or is otherwise subject to
12 mandatory reporting requirements pursuant to state or federal law.

13 (gg) Failing to follow federal and state laws regarding the storage,
14 use and release of confidential information regarding a client's personal
15 identifiable information or care.

16 (hh) Failing to retain records pursuant to section 12-2297.

17 (ii) Violating any federal or state law, rule or regulation applicable
18 to the practice of behavioral health.

19 (jj) Failing to make client records in the licensee's possession
20 available in a timely manner to another health professional or licensee on
21 receipt of proper authorization to do so from the client, a minor client's
22 parent, the client's legal guardian or the client's authorized
23 representative.

24 (kk) Failing to make client records in the licensee's possession
25 promptly available to the client, a minor client's parent, the client's legal
26 guardian or the client's authorized representative on receipt of proper
27 authorization to do so from the client, a minor client's parent, the client's
28 legal guardian or the client's authorized representative.

29 (ll) Being the subject of the revocation, suspension, surrender or any
30 other disciplinary sanction of a professional license, certificate or
31 registration or other adverse action related to a professional license,
32 certificate or registration in another jurisdiction or country, including the
33 failure to report the adverse action to the board. The action taken may
34 include refusing, denying, revoking or suspending a license or certificate,
35 the surrendering of a license or certificate, otherwise limiting, restricting
36 or monitoring a licensee or certificate holder or placing a licensee or
37 certificate holder on probation.

38 (mm) Any conduct that results in a sanction imposed by an agency of
39 the federal government that involves restricting, suspending, limiting or
40 removing the licensee's ability to obtain financial remuneration for
41 behavioral health services.

42 (nn) Violating the security of any licensure examination materials.

43 (oo) The use of fraud or deceit in connection with taking or assisting
44 another person in taking a licensure examination.

1 Sec. 2. Section 32-3253, Arizona Revised Statutes, as amended by Laws
2 2012, chapter 321, section 70, is amended to read:

3 32-3253. Powers and duties

4 A. The board shall:

5 1. Adopt rules consistent with and necessary or proper to carry out
6 the purposes of this chapter.

7 2. Administer and enforce this chapter, rules adopted pursuant to this
8 chapter and orders of the board.

9 3. Issue a license by examination, reciprocity or temporary
10 recognition to, and renew the license of, each person who is qualified to be
11 licensed pursuant to this chapter. The board must issue or deny a license
12 within one hundred eighty days after the applicant submits a completed
13 application.

14 4. Establish a licensure fee schedule annually, by a formal vote at a
15 regular board meeting.

16 5. Collect fees and spend monies.

17 6. Keep a record of all persons licensed pursuant to this chapter,
18 actions taken on all applications for licensure, actions involving renewal,
19 suspension, revocation or denial of a license or probation of licensees and
20 the receipt and disbursal of monies.

21 7. Adopt an official seal for attestation of licensure and other
22 official papers and documents.

23 8. Subject to title 41, chapter 4, article 4, employ personnel as it
24 deems necessary.

25 9. Conduct investigations and determine on its own motion if a
26 licensee or an applicant has engaged in unprofessional conduct, is
27 incompetent or is mentally or physically unable to engage in the practice of
28 behavioral health.

29 10. Conduct disciplinary actions pursuant to this chapter and board
30 rules.

31 11. Establish and enforce standards or criteria of programs or other
32 mechanisms to ensure the continuing competence of licensees.

33 12. Establish and enforce compliance with professional standards and
34 rules of conduct for licensees.

35 13. Engage in a full exchange of information with the licensing and
36 disciplinary boards and professional associations for behavioral health
37 professionals in this state and other jurisdictions.

38 14. Subject to section 35-149, accept, expend and account for gifts,
39 grants, devises and other contributions, money or property from any public or
40 private source, including the federal government. Monies received under this
41 paragraph shall be deposited, pursuant to sections 35-146 and 35-147, in
42 special funds for the purpose specified, which are exempt from the provisions
43 of section 35-190 relating to lapsing of appropriations.

44 15. **ADOPT RULES REGARDING THE USE OF TELEPRACTICE BEGINNING ON**
45 **NOVEMBER 1, 2015.**

1 B. The board may join professional organizations and associations
2 organized exclusively to promote the improvement of the standards of the
3 practice of behavioral health, protect the health and welfare of the public
4 or assist and facilitate the work of the board.

5 C. The board may establish a confidential program for the monitoring
6 of licensees who are chemically dependent and who enroll in a rehabilitation
7 program that meets the criteria prescribed by the board. The board may take
8 further action if a licensee refuses to enter into a stipulated agreement or
9 fails to comply with the terms of a stipulated agreement. In order to
10 protect the public health and safety, the confidentiality requirements of
11 this subsection do not apply if a licensee does not comply with the
12 stipulated agreement.

15 32-3253. Powers and duties

16 A. The board shall:

14 maintain a list of those programs. Approvals shall be valid for a period of
15 five years if no changes of curricula are made that are inconsistent with the
16 requirements of this chapter or board rule.

17 15. Maintain a registry of licensees who have met the educational
18 requirements to provide supervision as required pursuant to this chapter to
19 applicants in the same profession.

20 16. Adopt rules to allow approval of persons who wish to provide
21 supervision pursuant to this chapter and who are not licensed by the board
22 and who are licensed in a profession other than the profession in which the
23 applicant is seeking licensure.

24 17. Recognize not more than four hundred hours of psychoeducation for
25 work experience required pursuant to sections 32-3293, 32-3301, 32-3311 and
26 32-3321.

27 18. **ADOPT RULES REGARDING THE USE OF TELEPRACTICE BEGINNING ON**
28 **NOVEMBER 1, 2015.**

29 B. The board may join professional organizations and associations
30 organized exclusively to promote the improvement of the standards of the
31 practice of behavioral health, protect the health and welfare of the public
32 or assist and facilitate the work of the board.

33 C. The board may enter into stipulated agreements with a licensee for
34 the confidential treatment, rehabilitation and monitoring of chemical
35 dependency or ~~medical~~, psychiatric, psychological or behavioral health
36 disorders in a program provided pursuant to subsection D of this section. A
37 licensee who materially fails to comply with a program shall be terminated
38 from the confidential program. Any records of the licensee who is terminated
39 from a confidential program are no longer confidential or exempt from the
40 public records law, notwithstanding any law to the contrary. Stipulated
41 agreements are not public records if the following conditions are met:

42 1. The licensee voluntarily agrees to participate in the confidential
43 program.

44 2. The licensee complies with all treatment requirements or
45 recommendations including participation in approved programs.

1 3. The licensee refrains from professional practice until the return
2 to practice has been approved by the treatment program and the board.

3 4. The licensee complies with all monitoring requirements of the
4 stipulated agreement, including random bodily fluid testing.

5 5. The licensee's professional employer is notified of the licensee's
6 chemical dependency or medical, psychiatric, psychological or behavioral
7 health disorders and participation in the confidential program and is
8 provided a copy of the stipulated agreement.

9 D. The board shall establish a confidential program for the monitoring
10 of licensees who are chemically dependent or who have ~~medical~~, psychiatric,
11 psychological or behavioral health disorders that may impact their ability to
12 safely practice and who enroll in a rehabilitation program that meets the
13 criteria prescribed by the board. The licensee shall be responsible for the
14 costs associated with rehabilitative services and monitoring. The board may
15 take further action if a licensee refuses to enter into a stipulated
16 agreement or fails to comply with the terms of a stipulated agreement. In
17 order to protect the public health and safety, the confidentiality
18 requirements of this subsection do not apply if a licensee does not comply
19 with the stipulated agreement.

20 E. The board shall audio record all meetings and maintain all audio
21 and video recordings or stenographic records of interviews and meetings for a
22 period of three years from when the record was created.

23 Sec. 4. Title 32, chapter 33, article 1, Arizona Revised Statutes, is
24 amended by adding section 32-3256, to read:

25 32-3256. Executive director; complaints; dismissal; review

26 A. IF DELEGATED BY THE BOARD, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MAY DISMISS A
27 COMPLAINT IF THE INVESTIGATIVE STAFF'S REVIEW INDICATES THAT THE COMPLAINT IS
28 WITHOUT MERIT AND THAT DISMISSAL IS APPROPRIATE.

29 B. AT EACH REGULARLY SCHEDULED BOARD MEETING, THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR
30 SHALL PROVIDE TO THE BOARD A LIST OF EACH COMPLAINT THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR
31 DISMISSED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION A OF THIS SECTION SINCE THE LAST BOARD
32 MEETING.

33 C. A PERSON WHO IS AGGRIEVED BY AN ACTION TAKEN BY THE EXECUTIVE
34 DIRECTOR PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION A OF THIS SECTION MAY FILE A WRITTEN REQUEST
35 THAT THE BOARD REVIEW THAT ACTION. THE REQUEST MUST BE FILED WITHIN THIRTY
36 DAYS AFTER THAT PERSON IS NOTIFIED OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S ACTION BY
37 PERSONAL DELIVERY OR, IF THE NOTIFICATION IS MAILED TO THAT PERSON'S LAST
38 KNOWN RESIDENCE OR PLACE OF BUSINESS, WITHIN THIRTY-FIVE DAYS AFTER THE DATE
39 ON THE NOTIFICATION. AT THE NEXT REGULAR BOARD MEETING, THE BOARD SHALL

33 part of its investigation, the board may hold an investigational meeting
34 pursuant to this chapter. Any person may, and a licensee and any entity
