AMENDING SECTION 15-1655, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY 2020 PROPOSITION 208, SECTION 4; REPEALING SECTION 15-1655, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, AS AMENDED BY LAWS 2020, CHAPTER 85, SECTION 1; RELATING TO THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Subject to the requirements of article IV, part 1, 3 section 1, Constitution of Arizona, section 15-1655, Arizona Revised 4 Statutes, as amended by 2020 Proposition 208, section 4, is amended to 5 read: 6 15-1655. Arizona teachers academy; tuition and fees 7 scholarships; fund; annual report; definitions 8 Eligible postsecondary institutions shall implement an Arizona Α. 9 teachers academy to incentivize students to enter the teaching profession and to commit to teach in Arizona public schools OR FOR OR IN SCHOOLS THAT 10 11 SERVE PRIMARILY PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES, WHICH ARE 12 CONSIDERED PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION. The Arizona 13 in consultation with eligible board of regents, postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement centralized administrative 14 processes for the academy, including: 15 16 1. A marketing and promotion plan to recruit students for the 17 academy. 18 2. Data collection and reporting. 19 3. Tracking postgraduation service requirements. 20 4. Coordinating induction services. 21 5. Distributing monies in the Arizona teachers academy fund between 22 eligible postsecondary institutions. 6. Collecting reimbursement from individuals who fail to meet 23 24 service obligations. B. The Arizona teachers academy may include new or existing teacher 25 26 preparation program pathways that are student-focused and that employ proven, research-based models of best practices already being implemented. 27 28 Each eligible postsecondary institution may develop a portfolio of teacher 29 preparation programs to offer as part of the academy. EACH ELIGIBLE POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTION THAT ADMITS STUDENTS TO THE ARIZONA TEACHERS 30 ACADEMY MAY GIVE PRIORITY TO SENIOR AND JUNIOR STUDENTS BUT MAY NOT 31 32 EXCLUDE SOPHOMORE AND FRESHMEN STUDENTS. Programs offered as part of the 33 academy shall include accelerated models for: 34 1. High-demand teacher specializations, including special 35 education, science, technology, engineering and mathematics. 36 2. Critical need areas, including low-income public schools, public 37 schools located on Indian reservations, and rural public schools AND SCHOOLS THAT SERVE PRIMARILY PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES. 38 39 3. Individuals seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in 40 professional certification. 41 4. TEACHERS WHO ARE CURRENTLY TEACHING A DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSE TO SATISFY THE REQUIREMENTS FOR TEACHING A DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSE ADOPTED BY 42 43 A HIGHER LEARNING COMMISSION THAT ACCREDITS DEGREE-GRANTING POSTSECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS IN THE NORTH CENTRAL REGION, INCLUDING THIS 44 45 STATE.

5. STUDENTS IN NONEDUCATION PROGRAMS TO COMPLETE ONE OR MORE
TEACHER PREPARATION COURSES TO PREPARE THE STUDENT TO RECEIVE A TEACHING
CERTIFICATION FOLLOWING GRADUATION.

C. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formalized partnerships with public schools in this state to build commitments for teacher employment on completion of the Arizona teachers academy. The targeted deployment of teachers who have completed the academy shall be based on the needs of each school system and the community that is being served as well as the individual skills of each teacher.

D. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall provide to each 10 11 full-time student who is enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy an annual scholarship up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum 12 13 of two academic years or four semesters for graduate university students, up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for-a FOR A maximum of four 14 academic years or eight semesters for undergraduate university students, 15 16 up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of two academic 17 years or four semesters for community college students for tuition and 18 fees associated with the student's program of study, up to the actual cost of obtaining national board certification and renewal, and up to the 19 20 actual cost of obtaining a teaching certificate including the actual cost 21 of the exam, after all other financial gifts, aid or grants received by 22 that student or teacher. Scholarships under this subsection are subject 23 to all of the following:

1. If the student does not successfully complete the academic year in good academic standing, the student shall reimburse the Arizona board of regents for the total amount of the scholarship for tuition and fees the student received for that year.

28 2. For each academic year that the student successfully completes 29 and for which the student receives a scholarship for all tuition and fees, the student must agree to teach for one full school year in a public 30 31 school in this state. For students WHO ARE teaching and receiving the scholarship concurrently, the commitment period begins after graduation 32 33 from the Arizona teachers academy. For teachers seeking a national board certification, the teaching commitment is one additional year after 34 completing the requirements of the national board certification program. 35

36 3. IF A STUDENT ENROLLS IN A SUMMER TERM, THAT TERM MAY NOT BE 37 INCLUDED IN THE CALCULATION OF THE STUDENT'S POSTGRADUATION PUBLIC SERVICE 38 COMMITMENT.

39 3. 4. If the scholarship does not cover remaining tuition and fee 40 costs after other aid received, the eligible postsecondary institution may 41 not charge students the remaining difference. If the scholarship amount 42 exceeds tuition and fee costs at an eligible postsecondary institution, 43 the institution may use the remaining amount to support Arizona teachers 44 academy costs. 4. 5. If the student does not fulfill the student's obligation to teach in a public school, the student must reimburse the Arizona board of regents for the proportional amount of the scholarship for tuition and fees that the student received that corresponds to the number of school years the student agreed to teach but did not teach in a public school in this state.

7 5. 6. If the student is physically or mentally unable to fulfill 8 the requirements of the Arizona teachers academy, the Arizona board of 9 regents shall establish a process for assessing the student's ability to 10 repay the financial assistance received and shall make a determination on 11 DETERMINE any terms of repayment.

12 6. 7. The Arizona board of regents shall establish a process for 13 deferring service or repayment based on factors adopted by the board.

E. Students enrolled in a noneducation program in the Arizona teachers academy must complete one or more teacher preparation courses to ensure the likelihood that the student will transition into a postbaccalaureate program to receive a teaching certification following graduation.

19 The Arizona teachers academy fund is established consisting F. E. 20 of monies deposited pursuant to section 15–1281, subsection D, paragraph 5 21 and legislative appropriations made for the purpose of administering the 22 Arizona teachers academy. Monies in the fund are continuously 23 appropriated and are exempt from the provisions of section 35-190 relating 24 to the lapsing of appropriations. The Arizona board of regents shall 25 administer the fund and shall establish criteria for distributing monies 26 in the fund to eligible postsecondary institutions each fiscal year to 27 fund the costs of the academy. Monies in the fund may be used only for:

28 1. Reimbursing Arizona teachers academy scholarships that cover the 29 balance of tuition and fees for undergraduate, graduate and postbaccalaureate students enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy after 30 31 all other gifts and aid received.

32 2. Support for teachers who are currently employed in a public33 school in this state and who are seeking a national board certification.

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3. Induction services for Arizona teachers academy graduates.

35 4. Implementing a marketing and promotion plan to recruit and 36 retain students in the Arizona teachers academy with particular emphasis 37 on ensuring participants reflect the diversity of the state's student 38 population and administering the Arizona teachers academy. Annual 39 expenditures for marketing, promoting and administrating ADMINISTERING the 40 Arizona teachers academy may not exceed three percent of the monies in the 41 fund each fiscal year.

42 G. F. Monies remaining in the Arizona teachers academy fund at the 43 end of each fiscal year may be used by eligible postsecondary institutions 44 for Arizona teachers academy costs in the next fiscal year. 1 H. G. On or before March 1, 2020 and each year thereafter, the 2 Arizona board of regents shall report to the joint legislative budget 3 committee and the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting on 4 all of the following:

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5 1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy by eligible postsecondary institution in the current academic 7 year.

8 The number of Arizona teachers academy graduates receiving 2. 9 induction services in the current academic year.

10 3. The estimated amount of monies committed from the Arizona 11 teachers academy fund in the current fiscal year.

12 I. H. On or before September 1, 2019 and each year thereafter, the 13 Arizona board of regents shall report to the governor, the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives, and shall 14 submit a copy to the secretary of state, on all of the following: 15

16 1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers 17 academy at each eligible postsecondary institution by year of college 18 enrollment and the number of teachers receiving a scholarship through the 19 Arizona teachers academy for national board certification.

20 2. The percentage of students who completed each year of the 21 academy and who plan to continue to the subsequent year, delineated by 22 each teacher preparation program offered by each eligible postsecondary institution as part of the Arizona teachers academy. 23

24 3. The number of teachers who completed a program of study through 25 the Arizona teachers academy by each eligible postsecondary institution.

26 4. The number of teachers currently teaching in a public school in 27 this state as part of an agreement for receiving an Arizona teachers 28 academy scholarship.

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5. The number of graduates receiving induction services.

30 The number of students who have defaulted on their obligation 6. 31 and who are in repayment agreements.

32 33 7. The number of students who have deferred repayment agreements.

The number of students who have completed repayment agreements. 8.

The methodology for distributing any monies appropriated for the 34 9. Arizona teachers academy to each eligible postsecondary institution and 35 36 the amounts distributed to each.

37 10. The amount of unused monies in the Arizona teachers academy 38 fund from the prior fiscal year.

I. A COLLEGE IN THIS STATE THAT IS OWNED, OPERATED OR CHARTERED BY 39 40 A QUALIFYING INDIAN TRIBE ON ITS OWN INDIAN RESERVATION AND THAT OFFERS 41 BACCALAUREATE TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAMS MAY PARTICIPATE IN THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY AND RECEIVE MONIES FROM THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY FUND 42 43 ESTABLISHED BY THIS SECTION.

1	J. For the purposes of this section:
2	1. "Eligible postsecondary institutions" means universities under
3	the jurisdiction of the Arizona board of regents, and community colleges
4	in this state that offer postbaccalaureate programs that lead to teacher
5	certification and that have entered into an agreement with the Arizona
6	board of regents relative to these postbaccalaureate programs, AND
7	COLLEGES DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION I OF THIS SECTION IF THE COLLEGE OPTS TO
8	PARTICIPATE IN THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY UNDER SUBSECTION I OF THIS
9	SECTION.
10	2. "SCHOOL THAT SERVES PRIMARILY PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS WITH
11	DISABILITIES" MEANS A SCHOOL IN WHICH MORE THAN SEVENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF
12	THE STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE SCHOOL ARE PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS WHO ARE
13	PLACED AT THE SCHOOL ACCORDING TO AN AGREEMENT WITH A SCHOOL, A CHARTER
14	SCHOOL OR THE ARIZONA STATE SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND THE BLIND.
15	2. 3. "Tuition and fees" means tuition, mandatory fees and program
16	fees that are associated with a program in the Arizona teachers academy
17	leading to teacher certification and that are charged by an eligible
18	postsecondary institution.
19	Sec. 2. <u>Repeal</u>
20	Section 15–1655, Arizona Revised Statutes, as amended by Laws 2020,
21	chapter 85, section 1, is repealed.
22	Sec. 3. <u>Retroactivity</u>
23	This act applies retroactively to from and after December 31, 2020.
24	Sec. 4. <u>Requirements for enactment; three-fourths vote</u>
25	Pursuant to article IV, part 1, section 1, Constitution of Arizona,
26	section 15–1655, Arizona Revised Statutes, as amended by 2020 Proposition
27	208, section 4 and this act, is effective only on the affirmative vote of
28	at least three-fourths of the members of each house of the legislature.
