HOUSE BILL 2428

AN ACT

AMENDING SECTION 15-1655, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO SCHOOL EMPLOYEE TRAINING.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 15-1655, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 3 read: 4 15-1655. Arizona teachers academy; tuition and fees 5 scholarships; fund; reporting requirements; 6 definitions 7 A. Eligible postsecondary institutions shall implement an Arizona 8 teachers academy to incentivize students to enter the teaching profession 9 and to commit to teach in Arizona public schools or for or in schools that serve primarily public school students with disabilities, which are 10 11 considered public schools for the purposes of this section. The Arizona 12 board of regents. in consultation with eligible postsecondary institutions, shall develop and implement centralized administrative 13 processes for the academy, including: 14 1. A marketing and promotion plan to recruit students for the 15 16 academy. 17 Data collection and reporting. 2. 18 3. Tracking postgraduation service requirements. 19 4. Coordinating induction services. 20 5. Distributing monies in the Arizona teachers academy fund between 21 eligible postsecondary institutions. 22 6. Collecting reimbursement from individuals who fail to meet 23 service obligations. 24 B. The Arizona teachers academy may include new or existing teacher preparation program pathways that are student-focused and that employ 25 26 proven, research-based models of best practices already being implemented. 27 Each eligible postsecondary institution may develop a portfolio of teacher 28 preparation programs to offer as part of the academy. Each eligible 29 postsecondary institution that admits students to the Arizona teachers academy may give priority to senior and junior students but may not 30 31 exclude sophomore and freshmen FRESHMAN students. Programs offered as 32 part of the academy shall include accelerated models for: 33 1. High-demand teacher specializations, including special education, science, technology, engineering and mathematics. 34 35 2. Critical need areas, including low-income public schools, public 36 schools located on Indian reservations, rural public schools and schools 37 that serve primarily public school students with disabilities. 38 3. Individuals seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in 39 professional certification. 40 4. Teachers who are currently teaching a dual enrollment course to 41 satisfy the requirements for teaching a dual enrollment course adopted by 42 a higher learning commission that accredits degree-granting postsecondary 43 educational institutions in the north central region, including this 44 state.

5. Students in noneducation programs to complete one or more teacher preparation courses to prepare the student to receive a teaching certification following graduation.

C. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formalized partnerships with public schools in this state to build commitments for teacher employment on completion of the Arizona teachers academy. The targeted deployment of teachers who have completed the academy shall be based on the needs of each school system and the community that is being served as well as the individual skills of each teacher.

D. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall provide to each 10 11 student who is enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy an annual scholarship up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of two 12 13 academic years or four semesters for graduate university students, up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of four academic years 14 or eight semesters for undergraduate university students, up to the actual 15 16 cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of two academic years or four 17 semesters for community college students for tuition and fees associated 18 with the student's program of study, up to the actual cost of obtaining national board certification and renewal, and up to the actual cost of 19 20 obtaining a teaching certificate including the actual cost of the exam, 21 after all other financial gifts, aid or grants received by that student or 22 teacher. Scholarships under this subsection are subject to all of the 23 following:

1. If the student does not successfully complete the academic year in good academic standing, the student shall reimburse the Arizona board of regents for the total amount of the scholarship for tuition and fees the student received for that year.

28 2. For each academic year that the student successfully completes 29 and for which the student receives a scholarship for all tuition and fees, the student must agree to teach for one full school year in a public 30 31 school in this state. For students who are teaching and receiving the scholarship concurrently, the commitment period begins after graduation 32 33 from the Arizona teachers academy. For teachers WHO ARE seeking a national board certification, the teaching commitment is one additional 34 35 year after completing the requirements of the national board certification 36 program.

37 3. If a student enrolls in a summer term, that term may not be 38 included in the calculation of the student's postgraduation public service 39 commitment.

40 4. If the scholarship does not cover remaining tuition and fee 41 costs after other aid received, the eligible postsecondary institution may 42 not charge students the remaining difference. If the scholarship amount 43 exceeds tuition and fee costs at an eligible postsecondary institution, 44 the ELIGIBLE POSTSECONDARY institution may use the remaining amount to 45 support Arizona teachers academy costs. 5. If the student does not fulfill the student's obligation to teach in a public school, the student must reimburse the Arizona board of regents for the proportional amount of the scholarship for tuition and fees that the student received that corresponds to the number of school years the student agreed to teach but did not teach in a public school in this state.

6. If the student is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the requirements of the Arizona teachers academy, the Arizona board of regents shall establish a process for assessing the student's ability to repay the financial assistance received and shall determine any terms of repayment.

11 7. The Arizona board of regents shall establish a process for 12 deferring service or repayment based on factors adopted by the board.

13 E. The Arizona teachers academy fund is established consisting of monies deposited pursuant to section 15-1281, subsection D, paragraph 5 14 15 and legislative appropriations made for the purpose of administering the 16 Arizona teachers academy. Monies in the fund are continuously 17 appropriated and are exempt from the provisions of section 35-190 relating 18 to the lapsing of appropriations. The Arizona board of regents shall administer the fund and shall establish criteria for distributing monies 19 20 in the fund to eligible postsecondary institutions each fiscal year to 21 fund the costs of the academy. Monies in the fund may be used only for:

22 1. Reimbursing Arizona teachers academy scholarships that cover the 23 balance of tuition and fees for undergraduate, graduate and 24 postbaccalaureate students WHO ARE enrolled in the Arizona teachers 25 academy after all other gifts and aid received. REIMBURSEMENT FOR AN 26 ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY SCHOLARSHIP PROVIDED BY A DEGREE-GRANTING PRIVATE POSTSECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION MAY NOT EXCEED THE REMAINDER OF THE 27 AVERAGE IN-STATE TUITION AND FEES CHARGED BY UNIVERSITIES UNDER THE 28 29 JURISDICTION OF THE ARIZONA BOARD OF REGENTS, MINUS OTHER GIFTS AND AID 30 AWARDED TO THE STUDENT.

31 2. Support for teachers who are currently employed in a public 32 school in this state and who are seeking a national board certification.

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3. Induction services for Arizona teachers academy graduates.

4. Implementing a marketing and promotion plan to recruit and retain students in the Arizona teachers academy with particular emphasis on ensuring THAT participants reflect the diversity of the THIS state's student population and administering the Arizona teachers academy. Annual expenditures for marketing, promoting and administering the Arizona teachers academy may not exceed three percent of the monies in the fund each fiscal year.

41 F. Monies remaining in the Arizona teachers academy fund at the end 42 of each fiscal year may be used by eligible postsecondary institutions for 43 Arizona teachers academy costs in the next fiscal year. 1 G. On or before March 1, 2020 and each year thereafter, the Arizona 2 board of regents shall report to the joint legislative budget committee 3 and the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting on all of 4 the following:

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1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy by eligible postsecondary institution in the current academic year.

8 The number of Arizona teachers academy graduates receiving 2. 9 induction services in the current academic year.

3. The estimated amount of monies committed from the Arizona 10 11 teachers academy fund in the current fiscal year.

H. On or before September 1 each year, the Arizona board of regents 12 13 shall report to the governor, the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives, and shall submit a copy to the secretary 14 15 of state, on all of the following:

16 1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers 17 academy at each eligible postsecondary institution by year of college 18 enrollment and the number of teachers receiving a scholarship through the 19 Arizona teachers academy for national board certification.

20 2. The percentage of students who completed each year of the 21 academy and who plan to continue to the subsequent year, delineated by 22 each teacher preparation program offered by each eligible postsecondary 23 institution as part of the Arizona teachers academy.

24 3. The number of teachers who completed a program of study through 25 the Arizona teachers academy by each eligible postsecondary institution.

26 4. The number of teachers currently teaching in a public school in 27 this state as part of an agreement for receiving an Arizona teachers 28 academy scholarship.

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5. The number of graduates receiving induction services.

30 The number of students who have defaulted on their obligation 6. 31 and who are in repayment agreements.

32 33 7. The number of students who have deferred repayment agreements.

8. The number of students who have completed repayment agreements.

The methodology for distributing any monies appropriated for the 34 9. 35 Arizona teachers academy to each eligible postsecondary institution and 36 the amounts distributed to each.

10. The amount of unused monies in the Arizona teachers academy 37 38 fund from the prior fiscal year.

I. A college in this state that is owned, operated or chartered by 39 a qualifying Indian tribe on its own Indian reservation and that offers 40 41 baccalaureate teacher education programs may participate in the Arizona 42 teachers academy and receive monies from the Arizona teachers academy fund 43 established by this section.

J. A DEGREE-GRANTING PRIVATE POSTSECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION IN THIS STATE THAT OFFERS POSTBACCALAUREATE TEACHER PREPARATION PROGRAMS THAT LEAD TO TEACHER CERTIFICATION MAY PARTICIPATE IN THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY AND RECEIVE MONIES FROM THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY FUND SESTABLISHED BY THIS SECTION.

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J. K. For the purposes of this section:

7 1. "Eligible postsecondary institutions INSTITUTION" means ALL OF 8 THE FOLLOWING: universities

9 (a) A UNIVERSITY under the jurisdiction of the Arizona board of 10 regents.

11 (b) A community colleges COLLEGE in this state that offer OFFERS 12 postbaccalaureate programs that lead to teacher certification and that 13 have HAS entered into an agreement with the Arizona board of regents 14 relative to these postbaccalaureate programs. , and colleges

15 (c) A COLLEGE described in subsection I of this section if the 16 college opts to participate in the Arizona teachers academy under 17 subsection I of this section.

18 (d) A DEGREE-GRANTING PRIVATE POSTSECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION
19 DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION J OF THIS SECTION IF THE INSTITUTION OPTS TO
20 PARTICIPATE IN THE ARIZONA TEACHERS ACADEMY UNDER SUBSECTION J OF THIS
21 SECTION.

22 2. "School that serves primarily public school students with 23 disabilities" means a school in which more than seventy-five percent of 24 the students enrolled in the school are public school students who are 25 placed at the school according to an agreement with a school, a charter 26 school or the Arizona state schools for the deaf and the blind.

27 3. "Tuition and fees" means tuition, mandatory fees and program 28 fees that are associated with a program in the Arizona teachers academy 29 leading to teacher certification and that are charged by an eligible 30 postsecondary institution.
