AMENDING SECTION 8-526, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING TITLE 8, CHAPTER 4, ARTICLE 4, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTIONS 8-530.04 AND 8-530.05; RELATING TO FOSTER CHILDREN.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 8-526, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 3 read: 4 8-526. Child welfare; reporting requirements 5 A. The department shall make available program and outcomes data on 6 its website as provided in this section, in a format that can be 7 downloaded and that is conducive to analysis. B. The department shall make available the following information on 8 9 a semiannual basis by September 30 for the period ending the prior June 30 and by March 31 for the period ending the prior December 31: 10 11 1. Success in meeting training requirements. 12 2. Caseloads for child safety workers. 13 3. The number of new reports and reports that have been closed. 4. The number of case-carrying caseworkers in each region. 14 15 5. The number of investigations by region. 16 6. The number of children being served in-home and the number of 17 children being served out-of-home by each region. 18 7. The total number of reports received, by major category and by 19 priority. 20 8. The number of reports not responded to, by priority, by county and statewide. 21 22 9. The number of reports assigned for investigation by priority and by major category, by county and statewide for the current and previous 23 24 reporting periods. 25 10. The number of reports for investigations completed by priority 26 and by major category, by county and statewide for the current and previous reporting periods and as categorized by investigations that 27 28 resulted in: 29 (a) A substantiated report. 30 (b) A report currently proposed for substantiation. 31 (c) An unsubstantiated report. 11. The number of reports assigned for investigation that remain 32 33 open for investigation by priority and by major category, by county and 34 statewide for the current and previous reporting periods. 35 12. Of the number of children reported to the department, the 36 percentage of children placed in out-of-home care by county and statewide. 37 13. The number of newborn infants delivered to safe haven providers pursuant to section 13-3623.01. 38 14. The number of children entering out-of-home care by county 39 40 during the reporting period, and the number and percentage of the children 41 entering out-of-home care by county during the reporting period who are voluntary placements for children under eighteen years of age. 42 43 15. The number and percentage of children removed during the reporting period, by county and statewide, who had been in out-of-home 44 45 care:

1 (a) Within the previous twelve months. 2 (b) Within the previous twenty-four months, excluding the children 3 included in subdivision (a) of this paragraph. 4 16. The number and percentage of children who have remained in a 5 shelter or receiving home for more than twenty-one consecutive days, by 6 the child's age group. 7 17. The total number of licensed foster homes, the number of 8 licensed foster homes considered kinship homes, the number of licensed 9 community foster homes and the number of available spaces in licensed community foster homes. 10 11 18. The number of licensed foster homes that receive the required 12 visitation by licensing agency representatives pursuant to section 8-516. 13 19. The number of children placed in the care, custody and control of the department at the end of the reporting period and the number of 14 these children who receive the required visitation by case managers 15 16 pursuant to section 8-516. 17 20. The number and percentage of children who are in the care, 18 custody and control of the department at the end of the reporting period 19 and who are in out-of-home placement and as categorized by: 20 (a) Age. 21 (b) Ethnicity. 22 (c) Case plan goal. 23 (d) Type of out-of-home placement, categorized by age. 24 (e) Length of time in out-of-home placement of less than thirty days, thirty-one days to twelve consecutive months, twelve to twenty-four 25 26 consecutive months and more than twenty-four consecutive months, including 27 the median, average and range of the number of out-of-home placements. (f) Primary legal status including voluntary placement for a child 28 29 under eighteen years of age, temporary custody, adjudicated dependent, free for adoption, voluntary placement for a child over eighteen years of 30 31 age, dually adjudicated or any other legal status. 32 21. If the case plan is to return the child to the parent, the percentage of parents who receive the required contact by case managers. 33 22. The number and percentage of children who left the custody of 34 35 the department during the reporting period by reason for leaving care and 36 as categorized by: 37 (a) Age. 38 (b) Ethnicity. 39 (c) Number of placements. 40 (d) Average length of time in care. 41 23. The number of children with a petition for termination of parental rights granted and not granted during the reporting period by 42 43 county and statewide.

1 24. The number and percentage of children with a case plan goal of 2 adoption and who are not placed in an adoptive home at the end of the 3 reporting period and as categorized by: 4 (a) Age. 5 (b) Ethnicity. 6 (c) Average length of time in care. 7 (d) Legal status. 8 25. The number and percentage of children with a case plan goal of 9 adoption and who are placed in an adoptive home at the end of the reporting period and as categorized by: 10 11 (a) Age. 12 (b) Ethnicity. 13 (c) Average length of time in out-of-home placement. 14 (d) Length of time from change of case plan goal to adoptive 15 placement. 16 (e) Legal status. 17 (f) Marital status and relationship of the adoptive parent or 18 parents to the child. 19 26. The number of children whose adoptive placement was disrupted 20 during the reporting period and as categorized by: 21 (a) Age. 22 (b) Ethnicity. (c) Cause of the disruption. 23 24 (d) Marital status and relationship of the adoptive parent or 25 parents to the child. 26 27. The number of children whose adoptions were finalized during 27 the reporting period and as categorized by: (a) Average length of time in out-of-home placement before adoptive 28 29 placement. 30 (b) Average length of time in adoptive placement before the final 31 order of adoption. (c) Marital status and relationship of the adoptive parent or 32 parents to the child. 33 34 28. The number of children who died while in the custody of the 35 department by the county where the death occurred and as categorized by: 36 (a) The cause of death. 37 (b) The type of out-of-home placement at the time of death. 29. The number of children with an open or active child safety 38 services case who died due to abuse, categorized by the person or persons 39 40 who had care or custody of the child at the time of the child's death as 41 follows: 42 (a) Biological parent or parents. 43 (b) Other family member. 44 (c) Adoptive parent or parents. 45 (d) Foster care parent or parents.

1 (e) Other out-of-home care provider. 2 30. The number of children with an open or active child safety 3 services case who died due to abuse allegedly caused by an adult household 4 member who is not listed pursuant to paragraph 29 of this subsection. 5 31. The ratio of supervisors to specialists by region. 6 32. The source and use of federal monies in the department. 7 33. The source and use of state monies in the department. 8 34. INFORMATION REGARDING THE EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT OF FOSTER 9 CHILDREN PURSUANT TO SECTION 8-530.04, INCLUDING: 10 NUMBER 0F BEST EDUCATIONAL (a) THE INTEREST PLACEMENT 11 DETERMINATIONS CONDUCTED. (b) THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN WHO ENTERED FOSTER CARE AND WHO DID NOT 12 13 RECEIVE A BEST INTEREST EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT DETERMINATION. 14 (c) THE FINAL OUTCOME OF EACH BEST INTEREST EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT 15 DETERMINATION. 16 C. Based on the data presented in each reporting period, the 17 department, in as brief a format as possible, shall describe three to five 18 major challenges the department faces in achieving the goal of safe, 19 permanent homes for abused and neglected children. 20 D. Within three months after the end of each reporting period the 21 department shall submit a written report in as brief a format as possible 22 to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 23 representatives, the chairperson of the house human services committee, 24 the chairperson of the senate family services committee, or their 25 successor committees, and the cochairpersons of the joint legislative 26 committee on children and family services. The department shall submit a 27 copy of the report to the secretary of state. E. The department shall make available the following information on 28 29 an annual basis: 30 1. The percentage of substantiations upheld by the office of 31 administrative hearings. 32 2. The demographics and number of children placed with relative 33 caregivers. 34 3. The demographics of kinship foster caregivers. 35 4. The number of relative children per kinship foster care family. 36 5. The department's success at maintaining kinship foster care placements. 37 38 6. The type and cost of services provided to kinship foster care 39 families by licensed and unlicensed caregivers. 40 7. The cost of services provided to kinship foster caregivers 41 compared to the cost of out-of-home placements. 42 8. The number of children and families, by district, receiving 43 services through the housing assistance program during the previous fiscal 44 year.

1 9. The total amount of money spent on the housing assistance 2 program by region. 3 10. A programmatic and fiscal evaluation of the effectiveness of 4 the housing assistance program that includes the amount of foster care 5 expenditures avoided. 6 11. The number of children in the independent living program by 7 age, county and education status. 8 12. Beginning with the 2022 data period, the statewide number of 9 children in substantiated reports for investigation that are received in the twelve months before the current annual reporting period and that 10 11 allege neglect as defined in section 8-201, paragraph 25, subsection 12 SUBDIVISION (c) and the number of children in these reports who were: 13 (a) Removed within thirty days after the date the report is 14 received. (b) Removed within six months after the date the report 15 is 16 received. 17 F. The department shall make available the following information on 18 a monthly basis: 19 1. Operations and workforce data measures that include: 20 (a) Staff vacancy levels by position category and turnover. 21 (b) New hires, separations, turnover and voluntary attrition 22 delineated by field position. safety specialists. hotline staff. caseworkers in training, program, program supervisors, case aides, office 23 24 of child welfare investigations staff and administrative staff. 25 (c) Hotline performance. 26 (d) Reports received by maltreatment type, priority and response 27 time. 28 (e) Inactive cases by disposition. 29 (f) Open reports. (g) Entries and exits from the foster care population by exit type. 30 (h) Support service provision. 31 32 Demographics, placement types and case plan goals of the foster (j) 33 care population. 34 (j) The number and type of licensed foster homes that leave the foster care system and the reason for the exit. 35 36 2. Financial data that compares total expenditures each month and year-to-date as compared to prior year totals, appropriation totals and 37 projected expenditure totals, delineated by appropriation and appropriated 38 39 fund source. 40 G. The department shall make the information required pursuant to 41 subsection F of this section available within sixty days after the end of 42 the applicable reporting period. 43 H. The department shall notify the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the director of the joint 44 45 legislative budget committee and the director of the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting when an update is made on information
that must be made available pursuant to subsection B or F of this section.
Sec. 2. Title 8, chapter 4, article 4, Arizona Revised Statutes, is

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amended by adding sections 8-530.04 and 8-530.05, to read: 8-530.04. <u>Educational placement; best interest of child;</u> transportation

7 A. WITHIN FIVE DAYS AFTER A CHILD ENTERS FOSTER CARE OR IF A CHILD'S PLACEMENT CHANGES, THE CHILD, IF APPROPRIATE, THE CHILD'S 8 9 CASEWORKER, THE CHILD'S PARENT, GUARDIAN, CUSTODIAN, CAREGIVER OR FOSTER PARENT AND REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY OR THE CHILD'S 10 11 SCHOOL OF ORIGIN SHALL DETERMINE IF IT IS IN THE CHILD'S BEST INTEREST TO 12 REMAIN IN THE CHILD'S SCHOOL OF ORIGIN. THE DECISION SHALL BE BASED ON 13 ALL FACTORS RELATING TO THE CHILD'S BEST INTEREST, INCLUDING CONSIDERATION 14 OF THE CHILD'S UNIQUE EDUCATIONAL NEEDS, APPROPRIATENESS OF THE CURRENT EDUCATIONAL SETTING AND THE PROXIMITY TO THE SCHOOL IN WHICH THE CHILD IS 15 ENROLLED AT THE TIME OF PLACEMENT. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL 16 ENSURE 17 TRANSPORTATION FOR THE CHILD DURING THE BEST INTEREST EDUCATIONAL 18 PLACEMENT DETERMINATION PROCESS. IF IT IS DETERMINED THAT THE SCHOOL OF 19 ORIGIN IS NOT IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE CHILD, THE NEW EDUCATIONAL 20 INSTITUTION SHALL BE INCLUDED IN THE DETERMINATION PROCESS.

21 B. WITHIN TWO DAYS AFTER IT IS DETERMINED THAT A CHANGE OF 22 EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT IS IN THE BEST INTEREST OF THE CHILD, THE NEW EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION SHALL ENROLL THE CHILD AND THE CHILD'S SCHOOL OF 23 24 ORIGIN SHALL TRANSFER THE CHILD'S EDUCATION RECORDS TO THE CHILD'S NEW 25 EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION WITHIN TWO DAYS AFTER NOTICE OF THE CHILD'S CHANGE 26 IN EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT. A CHILD SHALL BE IMMEDIATELY ENROLLED IN THE 27 NEW EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION EVEN IF THE CHILD DOES NOT POSSESS THE RECORDS 28 NORMALLY REQUIRED FOR ENROLLMENT IN THE CHILD'S NEW EDUCATIONAL 29 INSTITUTION OR OWES ANY OUTSTANDING FINES OR FEES TO THE SCHOOL OF ORIGIN.

30 C. THE DEPARTMENT AND EDUCATIONAL AGENCY SHALL JOINTLY ENSURE THAT 31 A CHILD RECEIVES TRANSPORTATION TO THE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION DETERMINED TO BE IN THE CHILD'S BEST INTEREST, INCLUDING A CHARTER SCHOOL OR 32 33 EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION LOCATED OUTSIDE OF THE CHILD'S CURRENT SCHOOL DISTRICT. IN ENSURING A CHILD RECEIVES TRANSPORTATION TO THE EDUCATIONAL 34 35 INSTITUTION DETERMINED TO BE IN THE CHILD'S BEST INTEREST, THE DEPARTMENT 36 MAY COORDINATE WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND LOCAL EDUCATION 37 AGENCIES AND ENTER INTO NECESSARY INFORMATION SHARING, DATA SHARING AND FINANCIAL AGREEMENTS. A SCHOOL DISTRICT MAY CROSS SCHOOL DISTRICT 38 BOUNDARIES WHEN TRANSPORTING A STUDENT PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION. 39 THE 40 DEPARTMENT OR EDUCATIONAL AGENCY MAY PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO THE 41 CHILD'S CAREGIVER OR OTHER APPROVED ADULT FOR TRANSPORTATION IF THE DEPARTMENT AND THE CHILD'S NEW EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION ARE UNABLE TO 42 43 TRANSPORT THE CHILD.

4	DISPUTES BETWEEN THE DEPARTMENT OF CHILD SAFETY, LOCAL EDUCATIONAL
5	AGENCIES AND THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION REGARDING THE ARRANGEMENT FOR AND
6	FUNDING OF A CHILD'S TRANSPORTATION TO A SCHOOL DETERMINED TO BE IN THE
7	BEST INTEREST OF THE CHILD PURSUANT TO SECTION 8-530.04.
8	B. THE ARBITRATION PROCESS SHALL INCLUDE PROVISIONS TO ENSURE
9	TRANSPORTATION TO THE SCHOOL OF ORIGIN OR CURRENT EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT IF
10	A PRIOR BEST INTEREST DETERMINATION HAS BEEN MADE UNTIL THE DISPUTE IS
11	RESOLVED.
12	C. A DECISION RESOLVING A DISPUTE PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION SHALL BE
13	MADE WITHIN TEN BUSINESS DAYS AFTER RECEIPT OF THE DISPUTE.
