AMENDING SECTIONS 38-672 AND 38-673, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO TRAUMATIC EVENT COUNSELING.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 38-672, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 3 read: 4 38-672. Traumatic event counseling for public safety 5 employees; report; exceptions; definitions 6 Notwithstanding any other law, this state or a political Α. 7 subdivision of this state shall establish a program to provide public 8 safety employees who are exposed to any one of the following events while 9 in the course of duty up to twelve visits of licensed counseling, which may be provided through telehealth, paid for by the employer: 10 11 1. Visually OR AUDIBLY witnessing the death or maiming or visually 12 OR AUDIBLY witnessing the immediate aftermath of such a death or maiming 13 of one or more human beings. 14 being directly involved 2. Responding to or in а criminal investigation of an offense involving a dangerous crime against children 15 16 as defined in section 13-705. 17 3. Requiring rescue in the line of duty where one's life was 18 endangered. 19 B. Payment by the employer for licensed counseling pursuant to this 20 section does not create a presumption that a claim is compensable under 21 section 23-1043.01, subsection B. 22 C. For each program established pursuant to this section, this 23 state and each political subdivision of this state shall compile the 24 following data: 25 1. The total number of public safety employees who have 26 participated in the program. 27 2. The average number of visits per public safety employee. 28 3. The average number of months that a public safety employee 29 participated in the program. 30 4. The average number of days that a public safety employee who 31 participated in the program missed work. 5. The total number of public safety employees who participated in 32 the program and who subsequently filed a workers' compensation claim and 33 the number of those claims that were approved and the number of those 34 claims that were denied. 35 36 6. For each employer, the total amount of work missed by public 37 safety employees who participated in the program and how missed work was 38 provided for by the employer or through employee benefits. 39 D. On or before September 1 of each year, this state and each 40 political subdivision of this state shall submit the data collected 41 pursuant to subsection C of this section to the department of On or before October 1 of each year, the department of 42 administration. 43 administration shall compile the data into a report and submit the report to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 44 45 representatives, the chairperson of the senate health and human services

1 committee, or its successor committee, the chairperson of the house of 2 representatives health AND HUMAN SERVICES committee, or its successor 3 committee, the chairperson of the senate commerce and MILITARY AFFAIRS, 4 public safety AND BORDER SECURITY committee, or its successor committee, 5 and the chairperson of the house of representatives judiciary MILITARY 6 AFFAIRS and public safety committee, or its successor committee, and shall 7 provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state. Subsection C of 8 this section and this subsection do not authorize this state or a 9 political subdivision of this state to compile and report data that is protected under the health insurance portability and accountability act of 10 11 1996 (P.L. 104-191; 110 Stat. 1936).

12 E. This section does not apply to a state employer that provides a 13 program to its public safety employees that is characterized by all of the 14 following:

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1. The program is paid for by the employer.

16 2. The program provides licensed counseling for any issue. For 17 licensed counseling related to trauma experienced while in the line of 18 duty, the licensed counseling is provided on the request of the public 19 safety employee and is in person.

20 3. Before July 1, 2017, the program offers at least six visits per 21 year.

4. On or after July 1, 2017, the program offers at least twelvevisits per year.

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F. For the purposes of this section:

1. "Licensed counseling" means counseling provided by a licensed
 mental health professional.

27 2. "Licensed mental health professional" means a licensed 28 individual who specializes in trauma and crisis, who uses evidence-based 29 treatment options and who is one of the following:

30 (a) A psychiatrist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13 31 or 17.

32 (b) A psychologist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, 33 chapter 19.1.

34 (c) A mental health professional who is licensed pursuant to 35 title 32, chapter 33 and who holds either a master's or doctoral degree 36 related to the mental health profession.

37 (d) A mental health nurse practitioner or a psychiatric clinical
 38 nurse specialist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 15.

39 (e) A physician assistant who is licensed pursuant to title 32,40 chapter 25.

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3. "Public safety employee":

43 (i) Except as prescribed in subdivision (b) of this paragraph, an
44 individual who is a member of the public safety personnel retirement

Using deadly force or being subjected to deadly force in the 27 line of duty, regardless of whether the peace officer or firefighter was 28 physically injured. 29 5. Witnessing the death of another peace officer or firefighter while engaged in the line of duty. 30 31 6. Responding to or being directly involved in an investigation 32 regarding the drowning or near drowning of a child. 33 B. If the licensed mental health professional determines that the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER needs additional visits of 34 35 licensed counseling beyond that which the peace officer, or firefighter OR 36 911 DISPATCHER is entitled to under subsection A of this section and that the additional visits are likely to improve the peace officer's, or 37 firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S condition, the employer shall pay for up 38 39 to an additional twenty-four visits, if the visits occur within one year 40 after the first visit pursuant to this section. 41 C. An employer may not require a peace officer, or firefighter OR 42 911 DISPATCHER who is receiving treatment pursuant to this section to use 43 the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S accrued paid 44 vacation leave, personal leave or sick leave if the peace officer, or

1 firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER leaves work to attend a treatment visit 2 pursuant to this section.

3 If the licensed mental health professional determines that the D. 4 peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is not fit for duty while 5 the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is receiving treatment 6 pursuant to this section, the employer shall ensure that the peace 7 officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER has no loss of pay and benefits 8 for up to thirty calendar days per incident after the date the licensed 9 mental health professional determines that the employee is not fit for 10 duty if all of the following apply:

11 1. The peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is unable to 12 work light duty or the employer does not offer a light duty option.

2. The peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER has
 exhausted the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S sick
 leave, vacation leave or other leave that is provided as part of the peace
 officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S benefits package.

17 3. If the employer offers short-term disability benefits, the 18 employer offered and the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER 19 elected short-term disability benefits, but the peace officer, or 20 firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is not eligible to receive short-term 21 disability benefits.

4. The employer does not have a supplemental program that provides pay and benefits after the occurrence of an injury. For the purposes of this paragraph, supplemental program that provides pay and benefits after the occurrence of an injury does not include a supplemental benefits plan established pursuant to section 38-961.

27 E. An employer shall allow a peace officer, \overline{or} firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER to select the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 28 29 DISPATCHER'S own licensed mental health professional, except that if a health professional declines to provide counseling 30 licensed mental 31 pursuant to this section, the employer is not required to secure the services of that licensed mental health professional. The employer shall 32 pay the licensed mental health professional pursuant to the schedule of 33 34 fees that is fixed by the industrial commission of Arizona pursuant to 35 section 23-908.

F. Payment by the employer for licensed counseling pursuant to this section does not create a presumption that a claim is compensable under section 23-1043.01, subsection B.

G. For each program established pursuant to this section, this state and each political subdivision of this state shall compile the following data for peace officers, and firefighters AND 911 DISPATCHERS:

42 1. For each category of persons, the total number of persons who43 have participated in the program.

44 2. For each category of persons, the average number of visits per 45 person. 1 3. For each category of persons, the average number of months that 2 a person participated in the program.

3 4. For each category of persons, the average number of days that a 4 person who participated in the program missed work.

5 5. For each category of persons, the total number of persons who 6 participated in the program and who subsequently filed a workers' 7 compensation claim and the number of those claims that were approved and 8 the number of those claims that were denied.

9 6. For each category of persons, of the total number of persons who 10 have participated in the program, the percentage of persons who received 11 additional visits under subsection B of this section.

12 7. For each category of persons, the total number of persons who 13 were deemed not fit for duty by a licensed mental health professional 14 pursuant to subsection D of this section.

8. For each employer, the total amount of work missed by each 15 16 category of persons who participated in the program and how missed work 17 was provided for by the employer or through employee benefits.

18 H. On or before September 1 of each year, this state and each 19 political subdivision of this state shall submit the data collected 20 pursuant to subsection G of this section to the department of 21 administration. On or before October 1 of each year, the department of 22 administration shall compile the data into a report and submit the report to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 23 24 representatives, the chairperson of the senate health and human services 25 committee, or its successor committee, the chairperson of the house of 26 representatives health AND HUMAN SERVICES committee, or its successor 27 committee, the chairperson of the senate commerce and MILITARY AFFAIRS, public safety AND BORDER SECURITY committee, or its successor committee, 28 29 and the chairperson of the house of representatives judiciary MILITARY AFFAIRS and public safety committee, or its successor committee, and shall 30 31 provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state. Subsection G of 32 this section and this subsection do not authorize this state or a 33 political subdivision of this state to compile and report data that is 34 protected under the health insurance portability and accountability act of 35 1996 (P.L. 104-191; 110 Stat. 1936).

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1. The program is paid for by the employer.

40 The program provides licensed counseling for any issue. For 2. 41 licensed counseling related to trauma experienced while in the line of duty, the licensed counseling is provided on the request of the peace 42 43 officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER and is in person.

1 3. The program offers at least twelve visits per year and will 2 offer additional visits if the licensed mental health professional 3 determines that additional visits are necessary.

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J. For the purposes of this section:

5 1. "Licensed counseling" means counseling provided by a licensed 6 mental health professional.

7 2. "Licensed mental health professional" means a licensed individual who specializes in trauma and crisis, who uses evidenced-based 8 9 EVIDENCE-BASED treatment options and who is one of the following:

10 (a) A psychiatrist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13 11 or 17.

12 (b) A psychologist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13 19.1.

14 (c) A mental health professional who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 33 and who holds either a master's or doctoral degree related 15 16 to the mental health profession.

17 (d) A mental health nurse practitioner or a psychiatric clinical 18 nurse specialist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 15.

19 3. "911 DISPATCHER" MEANS A 911 DISPATCHER IN A PRIMARY OR 20 SECONDARY PUBLIC SAFETY ANSWERING POINT.
