19	B. Payment by the employer for licensed counseling pursuant to this

C. For each program established pursuant to this section, this state 1 2 and each political subdivision of this state shall compile the following 3 data:

4 1. The total number of public safety employees who have participated in the program. 5

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2. The average number of visits per public safety employee.

7 3. The average number of months that a public safety employee 8 participated in the program.

9 4. The average number of days that a public safety employee who 10 participated in the program missed work.

11 5. The total number of public safety employees who participated in 12 the program and who subsequently filed a workers' compensation claim and the number of those claims that were approved and the number of those 13 14 claims that were denied.

15 6. For each employer, the total amount of work missed by public safety employees who participated in the program and how missed work was 16 provided for by the employer or through employee benefits. 17

18 D. On or before September 1 of each year, this state and each political subdivision of this state shall submit the data collected 19 20 pursuant to subsection C of this section to the department of 21 administration. On or before October 1 of each year, the department of 22 administration shall compile the data into a report and submit the report 23 to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 24 representatives, the chairperson of the senate health and human services 25 committee, or its successor committee, the chairperson of the house of representatives health AND HUMAN SERVICES committee, or its successor 26 committee, the chairperson of the senate commerce and MILITARY AFFAIRS, 27 28 public safety AND BORDER SECURITY committee, or its successor committee, and the chairperson of the house of representatives judiciary MILITARY 29 30 AFFAIRS and public safety committee, or its successor committee, and shall provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state. Subsection C of 31 32 this section and this subsection do not authorize this state or a political

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subdivision of this state to compile and report data that is protected
 under the health insurance portability and accountability act of 1996 (P.L.
 104-191; 110 Stat. 1936).

4 E. This section does not apply to a state employer that provides a 5 program to its public safety employees that is characterized by all of the 6 following:

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1. The program is paid for by the employer.

8 2. The program provides licensed counseling for any issue. For 9 licensed counseling related to trauma experienced while in the line of 10 duty, the licensed counseling is provided on the request of the public 11 safety employee and is in person.

Before July 1, 2017, the program offers at least six visits per
 year.

4. On or after July 1, 2017, the program offers at least twelvevisits per year.

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F. For the purposes of this section:

1. "Licensed counseling" means counseling provided by a licensed
 mental health professional.

2. "Licensed mental health professional" means a licensed individual
 who specializes in trauma and crisis, who uses evidence-based treatment
 options and who is one of the following:

(a) A psychiatrist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 13
or 17.

(b) A psychologist who is licensed pursuant to title 32,chapter 19.1.

(c) A mental health professional who is licensed pursuant to
title 32, chapter 33 and who holds either a master's or doctoral degree
related to the mental health profession.

29 (d) A mental health nurse practitioner or a psychiatric clinical
 30 nurse specialist who is licensed pursuant to title 32, chapter 15.

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(e) A physician assistant who is licensed pursuant to title 32,
 chapter 25.

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3. "Public safety employee":

4 (a) Means:

5 (i) Except as prescribed in subdivision (b) of this paragraph, an 6 individual who is a member of the public safety personnel retirement system 7 or the corrections officer retirement plan.

8 (ii) Except as prescribed in subdivision (b) of this paragraph, a 9 probation officer, surveillance officer or juvenile detention officer who 10 is employed by this state or a political subdivision of this state.

(iii) EXCEPT AS PRESCRIBED IN SUBDIVISION (b) OF THIS PARAGRAPH, A
 911 DISPATCHER IN A PRIMARY OR SECONDARY PUBLIC SAFETY ANSWERING POINT.

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(b) Does not include peace officers or firefighters.

14 Sec. 2. Section 38–673, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 15 read:

38-673. <u>Traumatic event counseling for peace officers.</u> <u>firefighters and 911 dispatchers: report:</u> <u>exceptions: definitions</u>

A. Notwithstanding any other law, this state or a political subdivision of this state shall establish a program to provide peace officers, and firefighters AND 911 DISPATCHERS who are exposed to any one of the following events while in the course of duty up to twelve visits of licensed counseling, which may be provided through telehealth, paid for by the employer:

Visually witnessing the death or maiming or visually witnessing
 the immediate aftermath of such a death or maiming of one or more human
 beings.

28 2. Responding to or being directly involved in a criminal
 29 investigation of an offense involving a dangerous crime against children as
 30 defined in section 13-705.

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3. Requiring rescue in the line of duty where one's life was
 endangered.

4. Using deadly force or being subjected to deadly force in the line
of duty, regardless of whether the peace officer or firefighter was
physically injured.

6 5. Witnessing the death of another peace officer or firefighter7 while engaged in the line of duty.

8 6. Responding to or being directly involved in an investigation
9 regarding the drowning or near drowning of a child.

10 B. If the licensed mental health professional determines that the 11 peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER needs additional visits of 12 licensed counseling beyond that which the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is entitled to under subsection A of this section and that 13 14 the additional visits are likely to improve the peace officer's, or 15 firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S condition, the employer shall pay for up to an additional twenty-four visits, if the visits occur within one year 16 17 after the first visit pursuant to this section.

C. An employer may not require a peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER who is receiving treatment pursuant to this section to use the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S accrued paid vacation leave, personal leave or sick leave if the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER leaves work to attend a treatment visit pursuant to this section.

24 D. If the licensed mental health professional determines that the 25 peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is not fit for duty while the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is receiving treatment 26 27 pursuant to this section, the employer shall ensure that the peace officer, 28 or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER has no loss of pay and benefits for up to thirty calendar days per incident after the date the licensed mental health 29 30 professional determines that the employee is not fit for duty if all of the 31 following apply:

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1. The peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is unable to work light duty or the employer does not offer a light duty option.

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2. The peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER has exhausted the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S sick leave, vacation leave or other leave that is provided as part of the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 DISPATCHER'S benefits package.

3. If the employer offers short-term disability benefits, the
employer offered and the peace officer, or firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER
elected short-term disability benefits, but the peace officer, or
firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER is not eligible to receive short-term
disability benefits.

12 4. The employer does not have a supplemental program that provides 13 pay and benefits after the occurrence of an injury. For the purposes of 14 this paragraph, supplemental program that provides pay and benefits after 15 the occurrence of an injury does not include a supplemental benefits plan 16 established pursuant to section 38-961.

17 E. An employer shall allow a peace officer, \overline{or} firefighter OR 911 DISPATCHER to select the peace officer's, or firefighter's OR 911 18 19 DISPATCHER'S own licensed mental health professional, except that if a 20 licensed mental health professional declines to provide counseling pursuant 21 to this section, the employer is not required to secure the services of 22 that licensed mental health professional. The employer shall pay the 23 licensed mental health professional pursuant to the schedule of fees that 24 is fixed by the industrial commission of Arizona pursuant to section 23-908. 25

F. Payment by the employer for licensed counseling pursuant to this section does not create a presumption that a claim is compensable under section 23-1043.01, subsection B.

G. For each program established pursuant to this section, this state
and each political subdivision of this state shall compile the following
data for peace officers, and firefighters AND 911 DISPATCHERS:

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For each category of persons, the total number of persons who
 have participated in the program.

3 2. For each category of persons, the average number of visits per4 person.

5 3. For each category of persons, the average number of months that a 6 person participated in the program.

For each category of persons, the average number of days that a
person who participated in the program missed work.

9 5. For each category of persons, the total number of persons who 10 participated in the program and who subsequently filed a workers' 11 compensation claim and the number of those claims that were approved and 12 the number of those claims that were denied.

6. For each category of persons, of the total number of persons who
have participated in the program, the percentage of persons who received
additional visits under subsection B of this section.

7. For each category of persons, the total number of persons who
were deemed not fit for duty by a licensed mental health professional
pursuant to subsection D of this section.

8. For each employer, the total amount of work missed by each
 category of persons who participated in the program and how missed work was
 provided for by the employer or through employee benefits.

22 H. On or before September 1 of each year, this state and each political subdivision of this state shall submit the data collected 23 24 pursuant to subsection G of this section to the department of 25 administration. On or before October 1 of each year, the department of administration shall compile the data into a report and submit the report 26 to the governor, the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of 27 28 representatives, the chairperson of the senate health and human services 29 committee, or its successor committee, the chairperson of the house of 30 representatives health AND HUMAN SERVICES committee, or its successor committee, the chairperson of the senate commerce and MILITARY AFFAIRS, 31 32 public safety AND BORDER SECURITY committee, or its successor committee,

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and the chairperson of the house of representatives judiciary MILITARY AFFAIRS and public safety committee, or its successor committee, and shall provide a copy of this report to the secretary of state. Subsection G of this section and this subsection do not authorize this state or a political subdivision of this state to compile and report data that is protected under the health insurance portability and accountability act of 1996 (P.L. 104-191; 110 Stat. 1936).

 additional visits if the licensed mental health professional determines
 that additional visits are necessary.

1. "Licensed counseling" means counseling provided by a licensed
 mental health professional.

(c) A mental health professional who is licensed pursuant to title
32, chapter 33 and who holds either a master's or doctoral degree related
to the mental health profession.
