AMENDING SECTIONS 15-501.01 AND 15-701.01, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; RELATING TO SCHOOL CURRICULUM.

1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona: 2 Section 1. Section 15-501.01, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended 3 to read: 4 15-501.01. <u>Requirements for teachers; teaching certificates;</u> 5 rules; reciprocity; placement; posting 6 Α. Notwithstanding any other law, all teachers who are certificated 7 pursuant to this section must have a baccalaureate degree and a valid 8 fingerprint clearance card. 9 B. The state board of education shall adopt rules for the issuance 10 of the following types of certificates for teachers: 11 1. Standard teaching certificate. 12 2. Alternative teaching certificate for persons who obtain training 13 pursuant to subsection C, paragraph 1 of this section. 14 3. Subject-matter expert standard teaching certificate for persons who obtain training pursuant to subsection C, paragraph 8-9 of this 15 16 section. 17 4. Classroom-based standard teaching certificate for individuals 18 who obtain training from a school district or charter school. 19 5. Career and technical education teaching certificate. 20 C. The state board of education shall adopt rules to carry out the 21 purposes of this section. The rules: 22 1. Shall provide for a variety of alternative teacher and administrator preparation programs that allow for variations in program 23 24 sequence and design to apply for program approval. The state board shall 25 adopt rules pursuant to this paragraph designed to allow for a variety of 26 formats and shall not require a prescribed answer or design from the program provider in order to obtain approval from the state board. Any 27 rules adopted by the state board pursuant to this paragraph shall be 28 29 substantially different from the rules adopted for the approval of traditional preparation programs and may not unnecessarily restrict a 30 31 variety of alternative preparation programs from operating and providing instruction in this state. The state board shall evaluate each program 32 provider based on the program's ability to prepare teachers and 33 34 administrators and to recruit teachers and administrators with a variety of experiences and talents. The state board shall allow universities 35 36 under the jurisdiction of the Arizona board of regents, community colleges 37 in this state, private postsecondary institutions licensed by this state, school districts, charter schools, professional organizations, nonprofit 38 organizations and private entities to apply for program approval and shall 39 create application procedures and certification criteria that 40 are 41 substantially less restrictive than those for traditional preparation 42 programs. At the completion of an alternative preparation program, 43 graduates shall: (a) Hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited postsecondary 44

45 education institution.

1 (b) If applicable, demonstrate professional knowledge and subject 2 knowledge proficiency pursuant to section 15–533.

3 (c) Obtain a valid fingerprint clearance card pursuant to section
4 15-534.

5 6 (d) If applicable, complete training in structured English immersion as prescribed by the state board pursuant to section 15–756.09.

7 (e) If applicable, complete training in research-based systematic 8 phonics instruction as prescribed in paragraph 2 of this subsection.

9 (f) Demonstrate the required proficiency in the Constitutions of 10 the United States and Arizona as prescribed in section 15-532.

11 2. Shall require that, within three years after a certificate for 12 elementary education or early childhood education is issued, the 13 certificate holder complete, from a public or private provider, at least 14 forty-five classroom hours or three college-level credit hours, or the 15 equivalent, in both research-based:

16 (a) Science of reading instruction, including systematic phonics 17 instruction.

(b) Reading instruction, including training on assessments, instructional practices and interventions to improve student reading proficiency. Beginning July 1, 2021, instruction provided pursuant to this subdivision must meet the requirements for dyslexia training prescribed in section 15-219.

3. SHALL ESTABLISH A VOLUNTARY PERSONAL FINANCE ENDORSEMENT FOR
 CERTIFICATED TEACHERS WHO PROVIDE PERSONAL FINANCE INSTRUCTION IN ANY OF
 GRADES NINE THROUGH TWELVE.

26 3. 4. Beginning August 1, 2025, shall establish a literacy 27 endorsement as a requirement for all certificated teachers who provide literacy instruction in kindergarten programs or in any of grades one 28 29 through five as determined by the board. The rules shall require that a 30 certificated teacher who receives a certificate after August 1, 2025 and 31 who provides literacy instruction in kindergarten programs or in any of 32 grades one through five must obtain a literacy endorsement within three 33 years after the teacher's certificate is issued. The rules shall require that a certificated teacher who received a certificate before August 1, 34 35 2025 and who provides literacy instruction in kindergarten programs or in 36 any of grades one through five must obtain a literacy endorsement on or 37 before August 1, 2028. The literacy endorsement shall require the teacher 38 to complete evidence-based science of reading training or coursework as 39 determined by the board and to pass a literacy instruction assessment to 40 show that the teacher is capable of doing all of the following:

41 (a) Effectively teaching foundational reading skills, phonological
 42 awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.

43 (b) Implementing reading instruction using high-quality 44 instructional materials. 1 (c) Providing effective instruction and interventions for students 2 with reading deficiencies, including students with characteristics of 3 dyslexia.

4 4. 5. Beginning August 1, 2022, Shall require all approved 5 educator preparation programs in elementary education and early childhood 6 education to require the courses that are necessary to obtain a literacy 7 endorsement pursuant to paragraph 3-4 of this subsection.

8 5. 6. Shall establish a process to allow a local education agency, 9 at the request of a teacher, to verify to the department of education that the teacher possesses the instructional knowledge and skills prescribed in 10 11 paragraph 3-4 of this subsection, demonstrated through classroom 12 student achievement using observations and data across subgroups 13 evidence-based measures. A certificated teacher who has had a local education agency verify the teacher's knowledge and skills in the science 14 15 of reading pursuant to this paragraph is not required to complete the 16 coursework, training or assessment requirements prescribed in paragraph 17 3-4 of this subsection to obtain the literacy endorsement.

18 6. 7. Shall not require a teacher to obtain a master's degree or 19 to take any additional graduate courses as a condition of certification or 20 recertification.

21 7. 8. Shall allow but shall not require the superintendent of a 22 school district to obtain certification from the state board of education.

23 8. 9. Shall provide for the issuance of a subject-matter expert 24 standard teaching certificate to persons who have expertise in a content 25 area or a subject matter. Persons who are certified pursuant to this 26 paragraph shall complete training, if applicable, in structured English 27 immersion as prescribed by the state board pursuant to section 15-756.09. 28 Persons who are certified pursuant to this paragraph are exempt from the 29 subject knowledge proficiency requirements prescribed in section 15-533 30 and from the proficiency requirements prescribed in section 15-532 on the 31 Constitutions of the United States and Arizona. Persons who are subject to subdivision (a) of this paragraph are also exempt from the professional 32 33 knowledge proficiency requirements pursuant to section 15-533. A person who obtains a subject-matter expert standard teaching certificate pursuant 34 35 to this paragraph may provide instruction in the person's field of 36 expertise in grades six through twelve at any public school in this state. 37 Issuance of the subject-matter expert standard teaching certificate may not be conditioned on the person's employment with a local education 38 39 agency. A person who meets the requirements of this paragraph shall be 40 issued a subject-matter expert standard teaching certificate without 41 having to demonstrate professional knowledge proficiency pursuant to 42 section 15-533, except that the person shall have at least two years to 43 demonstrate professional knowledge proficiency pursuant to section 15-533. 44 School districts shall evaluate and provide support pursuant to section 45 15-537 to teachers who are certified pursuant to this paragraph. If a

1 person fails to meet the professional knowledge requirements of this 2 section within two years, the department of education or state board of 3 education may temporarily suspend the subject-matter expert standard 4 teaching certificate. A certificate that is temporarily suspended 5 pursuant to this paragraph is not considered a disciplinary action, and a 6 person shall be allowed to correct the deficiency within the remaining 7 time of the subject-matter expert standard teaching certification. This 8 paragraph does not require a person who has obtained another type of 9 teaching certificate from the state board to obtain a subject-matter expert standard teaching certificate pursuant to this paragraph in order 10 11 to provide instruction in grades six through twelve. Persons who are 12 certificated pursuant to this paragraph shall review and attest to 13 reviewing the best practices for social media and cellular telephone use 14 between students and school personnel adopted by the state board of education pursuant to section 15-203, subsection A, paragraph 44 before 15 receiving a certificate and, within two years 16 after receiving a 17 certificate, complete training in professionalism and ethics from a public 18 or private provider approved by the state board of education, which may 19 include a no-cost option to the person provided by the state board. A 20 person is eligible for a subject-matter expert standard teaching 21 certificate pursuant to this paragraph if the person has a baccalaureate 22 degree and meets any of the following requirements:

23 (a) Has taught courses relevant to a content area or subject matter 24 for the last two consecutive years and for a total of at least three years at one or more regionally or nationally accredited public or private 25 26 postsecondary institutions. A person demonstrates compliance with this 27 requirement by providing the state board with written proof of employment 28 for specific durations from one or more qualifying postsecondary 29 institutions.

30 (b) Has either a baccalaureate degree, a master's degree or a 31 doctoral degree in a specific subject area that is relevant to a content 32 area or subject matter taught in public schools.

33 (c) Demonstrates expertise through relevant work experience of at 34 least five years in a field that is relevant to a content area or subject 35 matter taught in public schools. A person demonstrates compliance with 36 this requirement by providing the state board with written proof of 37 employment.

38 9. 10. Notwithstanding section 15-533, shall exempt persons applying for a secondary education certificate from the subject knowledge 39 portion of the proficiency examination if the state board determines that 40 41 the person has work experience in science, technology, engineering or 42 mathematics and can demonstrate adequate knowledge of a particular subject 43 through a postsecondary education degree or twenty-four credit hours of relevant coursework. 44

1 10. 11. Shall allow for a certificate issued to a person pursuant 2 to subsection B, paragraph 1, 3, 4 or 5 of this section or section 15-203 3 or 15-782.01, as applicable, to be both issued and renewed for at least 4 twelve years and may not require more than fifteen hours of continuing 5 education credits each year in order to renew that certificate pursuant to 6 this paragraph.

7 11. 12. Shall allow for a certificate issued to a person pursuant 8 to subsection B of this section or section 15-132, 15-203 or 15-782.01, as 9 applicable, and any endorsement or approved area related to that certificate, to be renewed at least two years but not more than ten years 10 11 after that certificate expires without any other requirements adopted by 12 the state board of education or the department of education if the person 13 is in good standing and possesses a valid fingerprint clearance card 14 issued pursuant to section 15-534. A certificate renewed pursuant to this 15 paragraph shall be identical to the expired certificate.

The include а 17 requirement that the applicant possess a comparable valid certification 18 from another state and be in good standing with that other state. An 19 applicant who possesses a valid certification from another state and a 20 fingerprint clearance card pursuant to section 15-534 and who is in good 21 standing with that other state shall be issued a comparable standard 22 certificate or a comparable certificate issued pursuant to section 15-132, 15-203 or 15-782.01, as applicable, without any other requirements from 23 24 the state board of education or the department of education. A person who 25 is issued a certificate pursuant to this subsection is not required to 26 meet any requirement prescribed in section 15-533.

27 E. Placement decisions of teaching intern certificate holders issued pursuant to subsection C, paragraph 1 of this section and section 28 29 15-552 shall be based on agreements between the teacher preparation provider, the provider's partner organizations and the local education 30 31 agency. The practices of the department of education and the rules and 32 policies of the state board of education may not restrict placement of teaching intern certification holders based on local education agency 33 34 instructional models and may only consider the academic quality of the school, the effectiveness of the teaching intern certification holder's 35 36 on-site mentor and the opportunity for a wide variety of schools and 37 school models to access teaching intern certification holders.

38 F. Notwithstanding subsection A of this section, the following 39 persons are not required to have a baccalaureate degree:

40 1. A teacher who is otherwise exempt by law from obtaining a 41 baccalaureate degree and who provides instruction in STEM or career and 42 technical education pursuant to section 15-782.01.

The state board of education shall: 20 Prescribe a minimum course of study that incorporates the 1. 21 academic standards adopted by the state board for the graduation of pupils 22 from high school. 23 2. Prescribe competency requirements for the graduation of pupils 24 from high school incorporating the academic standards in at least the areas of reading, writing, mathematics, science and social studies. The 25 26 academic standards prescribed by the state board in social studies shall include personal finance, American civics education and a comparative 27 discussion of political ideologies, such as communism and totalitarianism, 28 29 that conflict with the principles of freedom and democracy that are essential to the founding principles of the United States. BEGINNING WITH 30 31 THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 2028, the state board may consider establishing a required SHALL REQUIRE A separate personal finance course THAT IS AT LEAST 32 33 ONE-HALF OF A COURSE CREDIT for the purpose of the graduation of pupils 34 from high school. A district school or 6 charter school shall document on the pupil's transcript only a pass or 7 fail designation that the pupil has passed or failed the test required by 8 this paragraph. A pupil in grade seven or eight may take the test 9 described in this paragraph, and if the pupil correctly answers at least 10 seventy of the one hundred questions on the test:

11 (a) The district school or charter school shall document on the 12 pupil's transcript only a pass or fail designation that the pupil has 13 passed or failed the test required by this paragraph.

14 (b) The pupil is not required to take the test required by this 15 paragraph again in high school.

16 4. Develop and adopt competency tests pursuant to section 15-741. 17 English language learners who are subject to article 3.1 of this chapter 18 are subject to the assessments prescribed in section 15-741.

The governing board of a school district shall: Β.

32 Prescribe curricula that include the academic standards in the 1. 33 required subject areas pursuant to subsection A, paragraph 1 of this 34 section.

35 Prescribe criteria for the graduation of pupils from the high 2. 36 schools the school district. These criteria shall include in 37 accomplishment of the academic standards in at least reading, writing, 38 mathematics. science and social studies, as determined by district 39 assessment. Other criteria may include additional measures of academic 40 achievement and attendance. Pursuant to the prescribed graduation 41 requirements adopted by the state board of education, the governing board 42 may approve a rigorous computer science course that would fulfill a 43 course required for graduation from high school. The mathematics governing board may approve a rigorous computer science course only if the 44 45 rigorous computer science course includes significant mathematics content

1 and the governing board determines the high school where the rigorous 2 computer science course is offered has sufficient capacity, infrastructure 3 and qualified staff, including competent teachers of computer science. 4 The school district governing board or charter school governing body may 5 determine the method and manner in which to administer a test that is 6 identical to the civics portion of the naturalization test used by the 7 United States citizenship and immigration services. A pupil who does not 8 obtain a passing score on the test that is identical to the civics portion 9 of the naturalization test may retake the test until the pupil obtains a 10 passing score.

11 C. The governing board may prescribe the course of study and 12 competency requirements for the graduation of pupils from high school that 13 are in addition to or higher than the course of study and competency 14 requirements that the state board prescribes.

D. The governing board may prescribe competency requirements for the passage of pupils in courses that are required for graduation from high school.

E. A teacher shall determine whether to pass or fail a pupil in a course in high school on the basis of the competency requirements, if any have been prescribed. The governing board, if it reviews the decision of a teacher to pass or fail a pupil in a course in high school as provided in section 15-342, paragraph 11, shall base its decision on the competency requirements, if any have been prescribed.

24 F. Graduation requirements established by the governing board may be met by a pupil who passes courses in the required or elective subjects 25 26 at a community college or university, if the course is at a higher level 27 than the course taught in the high school attended by the pupil or, if the course is not taught in the high school, the level of the course is equal 28 29 to or higher than the level of a high school course. The governing board 30 shall determine whether the subject matter of the community college or 31 university course is appropriate to the specific requirement the pupil 32 intends it to fulfill and whether the level of the community college or 33 university course is less than, equal to or higher than a high school course, and the governing board shall award at least one-half of a 34 35 Carnegie unit and up to and including one Carnegie unit for each three 36 semester hours of credit that the pupil earns in an appropriate community 37 college or university course. If a pupil is not satisfied with the decision of the governing board regarding the amount of credit granted or 38 39 the subjects for which credit is granted, the pupil may request that the 40 state board of education review the decision of the governing board, and 41 the state board shall make the final determination of the amount of credit 42 to be given the pupil and for which subjects. The governing board shall 43 not limit the number of credits that is required for high school graduation and that may be met by taking community college or university 44 45 courses. For the purposes of this subsection:

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2 3 1. "Community college" means an educational institution that is operated by a community college district as defined in section 15-1401 or a postsecondary educational institution under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe recognized by the United States department of the interior.

2. "University" means a university under the jurisdiction of the Arizona board of regents.

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7 G. A pupil who transfers from a private school shall be provided 8 with a list that indicates those credits that have been accepted and 9 denied by the school district. A pupil may request to take an examination in each particular course in which credit has been denied. The school 10 11 district shall accept the credit for each particular course in which the 12 pupil takes an examination and receives a passing score on a test designed 13 and evaluated by a teacher in the school district who teaches the subject 14 matter on which the examination is based. In addition to the above requirements, the governing board of a school district may prescribe 15 16 requirements for the acceptance of the credits of pupils who transfer from 17 a private school.

18 H. If a pupil who was previously enrolled in a charter school or 19 school district enrolls in a school district in this state, the school 20 district shall accept credits earned by the pupil in courses or 21 instructional programs at the charter school or school district. The 22 governing board of a school district may adopt a policy concerning the 23 application of transfer credits for the purpose of determining whether a 24 credit earned by a pupil who was previously enrolled in a school district 25 or charter school will be assigned as an elective or core credit. A 26 school district or charter school may note the learning outcomes that a 27 student mastered as prescribed in the rules adopted pursuant to section 28 15-203, subsection A, paragraph 38 to provide a record of the demonstrated 29 competencies and award partial credit.

30 I. A pupil who transfers credit from a charter school, a school 31 district or Arizona online instruction shall be provided with a list that indicates which credits have been accepted as elective credits and which 32 credits have been accepted as core credits by the school district or 33 charter school. Within ten school days after receiving the list, the 34 35 pupil may request to take an examination in each particular course in 36 which core credit has been denied. The school district or charter school 37 shall accept the credit as a core credit for each particular course in which the pupil takes an examination and receives a passing score on a 38 39 test that is aligned to the competency requirements adopted pursuant to 40 this section and that is designed and evaluated by a teacher in the school 41 district or charter school who teaches the subject matter on which the 42 examination is based. If a pupil is enrolled in a school district or 43 charter school and that pupil also participates in Arizona online instruction between May 1 and July 31, the school district or charter 44 45 school shall not require proof of payment as a condition of the school

1 district or charter school accepting credits earned from the online course 2 provider.

3 J. The state board of education shall adopt rules to allow high 4 school pupils who can demonstrate competency in a particular academic 5 course or subject to obtain academic credit for the course or subject 6 without enrolling in the course or subject.

7 K. Pupils who earn a Grand Canyon diploma pursuant to article 6 of 8 this chapter are exempt from the graduation requirements prescribed in 9 this section. Pupils who earn a Grand Canyon diploma are entitled to all the rights and privileges of persons who graduate with a high school 10 11 diploma issued pursuant to this section, including access to postsecondary 12 scholarships and other forms of student financial aid and access to all forms of postsecondary education. Notwithstanding any other law, a pupil 13 who is eligible for a Grand Canyon diploma may elect to remain in high 14 school through grade twelve and shall not be prevented from enrolling at a 15 16 high school after the pupil becomes eligible for a Grand Canyon diploma. 17 A pupil who is eligible for a Grand Canyon diploma and who elects not to 18 pursue one of the options prescribed in section 15-792.03 may only be 19 readmitted to that high school or another high school in this state 20 pursuant to policies adopted by the school district of readmission.

21 L. Each school district and charter school shall report to the 22 department of education all of the following aggregate data, organized by grade level, relating to the test that is identical to the civics portion 23 24 of the naturalization test used by the United States citizenship and 25 immigration services required by subsection A, paragraph 3 of this 26 section:

28 The percentage of pupils who passed by correctly answering the 2. 29 minimum number of questions required to pass the test pursuant to 30 subsection A, paragraph 3 of this section.

31 3. The percentage of pupils who failed by correctly answering fewer 32 than the minimum number of questions required to pass the test pursuant to 33 subsection A, paragraph 3 of this section.

4. Any other data required by the department relating to the test.

34 35 M. A school district or charter school may not include the 36 personally identifiable information of any pupil in the data reported to 37 the department of education under subsection L of this section. The department of education shall make the data publicly available, organized 38 39 at a minimum by school district or charter school and grade level, on the 40 website that includes the school report cards required by section 15-746.
