## **Overview**

Grants a victim of domestic violence or a sexual offense the right to receive a free copy of specified criminal case reports and recordings.

## **History**

A victim of a criminal offense or delinquent act, as well as his attorney, has the right to receive one free copy of a police report and video recordings from the investigating law enforcement agency if said offense involved the crime of: 1) criminal homicide; 2) rape; 3) robbery; 4) aggravated assault; 5) burglary; 6) larceny-theft; 7) motor vehicle theft; 8) arson; or 9) human trafficking. If said victim requests a minute entry or portion of the record — of any proceeding in the case that arises out of the offense committed against him — and such is needed for pursuing a claimed victim's right, then the court must provide a free copy (A.R.S. § 39-127; DPS, Crime in Arizona 2020 report).

## **Provisions**

- 1. Grants a victim of domestic violence or a sexual offense, or his attorney, the right to receive a free copy of:
  - a) the police report and video recordings from the investigating law enforcement agency; and
  - b) the minute entry or portion of the record, of any proceeding in the case that arises out of the offense committed against him, that is needed for pursuing a claimed victim's right. (Sec. 1)
- 2. Requires law enforcement agencies to prioritize the provision of the aforesaid police reports requested by a victim of domestic violence or sexual offenses. (Sec. 1)
- 3. Defines sexual offense. (Sec. 1)
- 4. Makes technical and conforming changes. (Sec. 1)
