AMENDING SECTIONS 15-1626, 15-1650.06, 15-1655, 15-1682.03, 15-1705 AND 15-1809, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES; AMENDING TITLE 15, CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 1, ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES, BY ADDING SECTION 15-1809.02; APPROPRIATING MONIES; RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

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1 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Arizona:
2 Section 1. Section 15-1626, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to
3 read:
4 15-1626. General administrative powers and duties of board;

15-1626. <u>General administrative powers and duties of board;</u> <u>definition</u>

- A. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS shall:
- Have and exercise the powers necessary for the effective 7 8 governance and administration of the institutions under its THE BOARD'S 9 control. To that end, the board may adopt, and authorize each university 10 to adopt, such regulations, policies, rules or measures as are deemed 11 necessary and may delegate in writing to its THE BOARD'S committees, to 12 its university presidents, or their THE PRESIDENTS' designees, or to other 13 entities under its THE BOARD'S control, any part of its THE BOARD'S 14 authority for the administration and governance of such THOSE 15 institutions, including those powers enumerated in section 15-1625, 16 subsection B, paragraphs 2 and 4, paragraphs 3, 4, 8, 9, 11 and 12 of this 17 subsection and subsection B of this section. Any delegation of authority 18 may be rescinded by the board at any time in whole or in part.
- 2. Appoint and employ and determine the compensation of presidents with such THE power and authority and for such THE purposes in connection with the operation of the institutions as the board deems necessary.
- 22 3. Appoint and employ and determine the compensation of VICE 23 vice-presidents PRESIDENTS, deans, professors. instructors. 24 lecturers, fellows and such THE other officers and employees with such THE 25 power and authority and for such THE purposes in connection with the 26 operation of the institutions as the board deems necessary, or delegate 27 its THE BOARD'S authority pursuant to paragraph 1 of this subsection.
- 4. Remove any officer or employee when the interests of education 29 in this state so require in accordance with its THE BOARD'S personnel 30 rules and policies.
- Fix tuitions and fees to be charged and differentiate the 31 5. and 32 tuitions fees between institutions and between 33 nonresidents, undergraduate students, graduate students, students from 34 foreign countries and students who have earned credit hours in excess of 35 the credit hour threshold. For the purposes of this paragraph, the 36 undergraduate credit hour threshold is one hundred forty-five hours for 37 students who attend a university under the jurisdiction of the board. The 38 undergraduate credit hour threshold shall be based on the actual full-time 39 equivalent student enrollment counted on the forty-fifth day of every fall 40 and spring semester, divided by two, and any budget adjustment based on 41 student enrollment shall occur in the fiscal year following the actual 42 full-time equivalent student enrollment count. The undergraduate credit 43 hour threshold shall not apply to degree programs that require credit 44 hours above the credit hour threshold, credits earned in the pursuit of up 45 to two baccalaureate degrees, credits earned in the pursuit of up to two

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1 state regulated licensures or certificates, credits earned in the pursuit 2 of teaching certification, credits transferred from a private institution 3 of higher education, credits transferred from an institution of higher 4 education in another state, credits earned at another institution of 5 higher education but that are not accepted as transfer credits at the 6 university where the student is currently enrolled and credits earned by 7 students who enroll at a university under the jurisdiction of the board 8 more than twenty-four months after the end of that student's previous 9 enrollment at a public institution of higher education in this state. 10 or before October 15 of each year, the board shall report to the joint 11 legislative budget committee the number of in-state students 12 out-of-state students who were enrolled at universities under 13 jurisdiction of the board during the previous fiscal year and who met or 14 exceeded the undergraduate credit hour threshold prescribed in this 15 paragraph. The amount of tuition and fees included in the operating 16 budget for the university adopted by the board as prescribed in paragraph 17 13 of this subsection shall be IS subject to legislative appropriation and 18 SHALL BE deposited in a separate tuition and fees subaccount for each 19 university. All other tuition and fee revenue shall be retained by each 20 university for expenditure as approved by the board in a separate local 21 tuition and fees subaccount for each university. This subaccount shall 22 consist of only tuition and fees. The universities shall not use any 23 tuition or fee revenue to fund or support an alumni association.

- 6. Adopt rules to govern its THE BOARD'S tuition and academic fee setting process that provide for the following:
- 26 (a) At least one public hearing at each university as an 27 opportunity for students and members of the public to comment on any 28 proposed increase in tuition or fees.
- 29 (b) Publication of the notice of public hearing at least ten days 30 before the hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in Maricopa 31 county, Coconino county and Pima county. The notice shall include the 32 date, time and location of the public hearing.
- 33 (c) Public disclosure by each university of any proposed increases 34 in tuition or fees at least ten days before the public hearing.
- 35 (d) A roll call vote of any final board action on changes in 36 tuition, including tuition rate changes for online programs, or academic 37 fees.
- 38 (e) Public disclosure by the board and each university of any final 39 board action on changes in tuition or academic fees.
- 7. Pursuant to section 35-115, submit a budget request for each institution under its THE BOARD'S jurisdiction that includes the estimated tuition and fee revenue available to support the programs of the institution as described in the budget request. The estimated available tuition and fee revenue shall be based on the tuition and registration fee

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1 rates in effect at the time the budget request is submitted with 2 adjustments for projected changes in enrollment as provided by the board.

- 8. Establish curricula and designate courses at the several institutions that in its THE BOARD'S judgment will best serve the interests of this state.
- 6 9. Award such degrees and diplomas on the completion of such THE 7 courses and curriculum requirements as it THAT THE BOARD deems 8 appropriate.
- 10. Prescribe qualifications for admission of all students to the universities. The board shall establish policies for guaranteed admission that ensure fair and equitable access to students in this state from public, private and charter schools and homeschools. For the purpose of determining the qualifications of honorably discharged veterans, veterans are those persons who served in the armed forces for a minimum of AT LEAST two years and who were previously enrolled at a university or community college in this state. No Prior failing grades received by the A veteran at the university or community college in this state may NOT be considered.
- 19 11. Adopt any energy conservation standards adopted by the 20 department of administration for the construction of new buildings.
- 21 12. Employ for such THE time and purposes as THAT the board 22 requires attorneys whose compensation shall be fixed and paid by the 23 board. Litigation to which the board is a party and for which 24 self-insurance is not provided may be compromised or settled at the 25 direction of the board.
- 13. Adopt annually an operating budget for each university equal to 27 the sum of appropriated STATE general fund monies and the amount of 28 tuition and fees approved by the board and allocated to each university 29 operating budget.
- 14. In consultation with the state board of education and other education groups, develop and implement a program to award honors endorsements to be affixed to the high school diplomas of qualifying high school pupils and to be included in the transcripts of pupils who are awarded endorsements. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS shall develop application procedures and testing criteria and adopt testing instruments and procedures to administer the program. In order to receive an honors endorsement, a pupil must demonstrate an extraordinary level of knowledge, skill and competency as measured by the testing instruments adopted by the ARIZONA board OF REGENTS in mathematics, English, science and social studies. Additional subjects may be added at the determination of the ARIZONA board OF REGENTS. The program is voluntary for pupils.
- 42 15. Require the publisher of each literary and nonliterary textbook 43 used in the universities of this state to furnish to the Arizona board of 44 regents computer software in a standardized format when software becomes

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1 available for nonliterary textbooks from which braille versions of the 2 textbooks may be produced.

- 3 16. Require universities that provide a degree in education to 4 require courses that are necessary to obtain a provisional structured 5 English immersion endorsement as prescribed by the state board of 6 education.
- 7 17. Acquire FOR EACH CLASSROOM United States flags for each 8 classroom that are manufactured in the United States and that are at least 9 two feet by three feet, and hardware to appropriately display the United 10 States flags, acquire AND a legible copy of the Constitution of the United 11 States and the Bill of Rights. THE BOARD SHALL display the flags in 12 each classroom in accordance with title 4 of the United States Code and 13 display a legible copy of the Constitution of the United States and the 14 Bill of Rights adjacent to the flag.
- 18. To facilitate the transfer of military personnel and their 16 dependents to and from the public schools of this state, pursue, in 17 cooperation with the state board of education, reciprocity agreements with 18 other states concerning the transfer credits for military personnel and 19 their dependents. A reciprocity agreement entered into pursuant to this 20 paragraph shall:
 - (a) Address procedures for each of the following:
 - (i) The transfer of student records.
 - (ii) Awarding credit for completed coursework.
- 24 (iii) Permitting a student to satisfy the graduation requirements 25 prescribed in section 15-701.01 through the successful performance on 26 comparable exit-level assessment instruments administered in another 27 state.
- 28 (b) Include appropriate criteria developed by the state board of 29 education and the Arizona board of regents.
- 30 19. Require a university to publicly post notices of all of its THE 31 UNIVERSITY'S employment openings, including the title and description, 32 instructions for applying and relevant contact information.
- 20. In consultation with the community college districts in this 34 state, develop and implement common equivalencies for specific levels of 35 achievement on advanced placement examinations and international 36 baccalaureate examinations in order to award commensurate postsecondary 37 academic credits at community colleges and public universities in this 38 state.
- 21. On or before August 1 of each year, report to the joint 40 legislative budget committee the graduation rate by university campus 41 during the previous fiscal year. The board shall also report the 42 retention rate by university campus and by class, as determined by date of 43 entry during the previous fiscal year.
- B. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS shall adopt personnel policies for 45 all employees of the board and the universities.

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- C. In conjunction with the auditor general, the ARIZONA board OF REGENTS shall develop a uniform accounting and reporting system, which shall be reviewed by the joint legislative budget committee before final adoption by the board. The board shall require each university to comply with the uniform accounting and reporting system.
- D. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS may employ legal assistance in 7 procuring loans for the institutions from the United States government. 8 Fees or compensation paid for such legal assistance PURSUANT TO THIS 9 SUBSECTION shall not be a claim on the STATE general fund of this state 10 but shall be paid from funds of the institutions.
- 11 E. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS shall approve or disapprove any 12 contract or agreement entered into by the university of Arizona hospital 13 with the Arizona industrial development authority.
- F. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS may adopt policies that authorize the institutions under its jurisdiction to enter into employment contracts with nontenured employees for periods of more than one year but not more than five years. The policies shall MUST prescribe limitations LIMITS on the authority of the institutions to enter into employment contracts for periods of more than one year but not more than five years, including the requirement that the board approve the contracts.
- 21 G. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS may adopt a plan or plans for 22 employee benefits that allow for participation in a cafeteria plan that 23 meets the requirements of the United States internal revenue code of 1986.
- H. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS may establish a program for the exchange of students between the universities under the jurisdiction of the board and colleges and universities located in the state of Sonora, Mexico. Notwithstanding subsection A, paragraph 5 of this section, the program may provide for in-state tuition at the universities under the jurisdiction of the board for fifty Sonoran students in exchange for similar tuition provisions for up to fifty Arizona students enrolled or seeking enrollment in Sonoran colleges or universities. The board may direct the universities to work in conjunction with the Arizona-Mexico commission to coordinate recruitment and admissions activities.
- I. The Arizona board of regents, in collaboration with the universities under its THE BOARD'S jurisdiction, shall adopt a performance funding model. The performance funding model shall use USING performance metrics that include the increase in degrees awarded, the increase in completed student credit hours and the increase in externally generated research and public service funding. The funding formula may give added weight to degrees related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics and other high-value degrees that are in short supply or that are essential to this state's long-term economic development strategy.
- J. The Arizona board of regents shall use the performance funding 44 model adopted pursuant to subsection I of this section in developing and

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1 submitting budget requests for the universities under $\frac{\text{its}}{\text{its}}$ THE BOARD'S 2 jurisdiction.

- 3 K. On or before November 1 of each year, the Arizona board of 4 regents shall submit to the joint legislative budget committee and the 5 governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting a report on 6 university debt and obligations, including:
 - 1. Long-term notes and obligations.
- 8 2. Certificates of participation and other obligations pursuant to 9 any lease-purchase agreements.
 - 3. Revenue bonds.
 - 4. Bonds issued pursuant to section 15-1682.03.
 - 5. Commercial paper issued pursuant to section 15-1696.
- 13 L. The report issued SUBMITTED pursuant to subsection K of this 14 section shall MUST contain, for the most recent fiscal year:
- 15 1. The aggregate level of outstanding principal and the principal 16 and interest payments, by type of debt or obligation.
- 2. An itemization, by campus and project, of the amount of yearly la principal and interest to be paid in the most recent and the next five fiscal years.
- M. The ARIZONA board OF REGENTS may enter into an intergovernmental agreement pursuant to section 15-1747 to manage universities under its THE 22 BOARD'S jurisdiction subject to the terms of the reciprocity agreement.
- N. ON OR BEFORE NOVEMBER 1, 2025 AND EACH YEAR THEREAFTER, THE 24 ARIZONA BOARD OF REGENTS SHALL SUBMIT TO THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE BUDGET 25 COMMITTEE EACH OF THE FOLLOWING FOR REVIEW:
- 26 1. THE AMOUNT OF MONIES THAT THE BOARD RETAINED FROM EACH 27 UNIVERSITY UNDER THE BOARD'S JURISDICTION TO SUPPLEMENT THE BOARD'S 28 OPERATING BUDGET.
- 29 2. THE BOARD'S EXPENDITURE PLAN FOR THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR FOR 30 MONIES THAT THE BOARD RETAINED FROM EACH UNIVERSITY UNDER THE BOARD'S 31 JURISDICTION.
- 32 3. AN ACCOUNTING OF HOW THE BOARD SPENT MONIES THAT THE BOARD 33 RETAINED FROM THE UNIVERSITIES UNDER THE BOARD'S JURISDICTION IN THE 34 IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING FISCAL YEAR.
- 85 N. 0. For the purposes of this section, "university debt and 36 obligations" means debt and obligations, the principal and interest of 37 which are paid in whole or in part with university monies.
- 38 Sec. 2. Section 15-1650.06, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 39 read:

15-1650.06. Arizona veterinary loan assistance program; fund; annual report; rules; definitions

- 42 A. The Arizona veterinary loan assistance program is established 43 within the Arizona board of regents.
- B. The Arizona veterinary loan assistance fund is established to consisting of legislative appropriations. The board shall administer the

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1 fund. Monies in the fund are continuously appropriated and are exempt 2 from the provisions of section 35-190 relating to lapsing of 3 appropriations. ON NOTICE FROM THE ARIZONA BOARD OF REGENTS, THE STATE 4 TREASURER SHALL INVEST AND DIVEST MONIES IN THE FUND AS PROVIDED BY 5 SECTION 35-313, AND MONIES EARNED FROM INVESTMENT SHALL BE CREDITED TO THE 6 FUND. The board shall use monies in the fund for the purposes prescribed 7 in this section and may retain up to three percent of the monies deposited 8 in the fund for costs associated with administering the program.

- 9 C. A person who obtains a doctor of veterinary medicine degree from 10 a veterinary college after January 1, 2023 and who signs an agreement 11 pursuant to subsection D of this section may apply to the board to 12 participate in the program.
- D. To participate in the program, the board shall require an 14 applicant to sign an agreement to both:
- 15 1. Remain and work as a full-time veterinarian in this state for 16 the following four years.
- 2. Work in one of the following practice areas for at least two of 18 the four years:
- 19 (a) AN agricultural practice in an area designated by the United 20 States department of agriculture as having a shortage.
 - (b) A nonprofit, county or municipal shelter.
- E. At the conclusion of the four-year commitment described in subsection D of this section, the board shall determine whether the veterinarian satisfied the terms of the agreement described in subsection D of this section. If the board determines that the veterinarian satisfied the terms of the agreement described in subsection D of this section, the board shall distribute to the veterinarian from the Arizona veterinary loan assistance fund an amount that is equal to the amount of the veterinarian's outstanding veterinary college educational loan balance or \$100,000, whichever is less. The board shall distribute monies from the fund subject to the availability of monies and legislative appropriation and on a first-come, first-served basis. For the purposes of this subsection, "educational loan balance" means the balance of the principal, interest and related expenses of the educational loan.
- F. On or before October 1 of each year, the board shall compile a 36 report that details how the Arizona veterinary loan assistance fund monies 37 are being spent and shall submit this report to the governor, the 38 president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives. 39 The board shall submit a copy of this report to the secretary of state.
- 40 G. The board may adopt rules for the purposes of carrying out this 41 section.
 - H. For the purposes of this section:
 - 1. "Board" means the Arizona board of regents.
- 44 2. "Veterinarian" has the same meaning prescribed in section 45 32-2201.

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- 3. "Veterinary college" has the same meaning prescribed in section 2 32-2201.
- 3 Sec. 3. Section 15-1655, Arizona Revised Statutes, is amended to 4 read:

15-1655. Arizona teachers academy; tuition and fees scholarships; fund; annual report; definitions

- 7 A. Eligible postsecondary institutions shall implement an Arizona 8 teachers academy to incentivize students to enter the teaching profession 9 and to commit to teach in Arizona public schools or for or in schools that 10 serve primarily public school students with disabilities, which are 11 considered public schools for the purposes of this section. The Arizona consultation with eligible 12 board of regents. in postsecondary 13 institutions, shall develop and implement centralized administrative 14 processes for the academy, including:
- 1. A marketing and promotion plan to recruit students for the 16 academy.
 - 2. Data collection and reporting.
 - 3. Tracking postgraduation service requirements.
 - 4. Coordinating induction services.
- 5. Distributing monies in the Arizona teachers academy fund between eligible postsecondary institutions.
- 6. Collecting reimbursement from individuals who fail to meet service obligations.
- B. The Arizona teachers academy may include new or existing teacher preparation program pathways that are student-focused and that employ proven, research-based models of best practices already being implemented. Each eligible postsecondary institution may develop a portfolio of teacher preparation programs to offer as part of the academy. Each eligible postsecondary institution that admits students to the Arizona teachers academy may give priority to senior and junior students but may not exclude sophomore and freshmen FRESHMAN students. Programs offered as part of the academy shall include accelerated models for:
- 1. High-demand teacher specializations, including special deducation, science, technology, engineering and mathematics.
- 2. Critical need areas, including low-income public schools, public schools located on Indian reservations, rural public schools and schools that serve primarily public school students with disabilities.
- 38 3. Individuals seeking postbaccalaureate coursework that results in 39 professional certification.
- 40 4. Teachers who are currently teaching a dual enrollment course to 41 satisfy the requirements for teaching a dual enrollment course adopted by 42 a higher learning commission that accredits degree-granting postsecondary 43 educational institutions in the north central region, including this 44 state.

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- 5. Students in noneducation programs to complete one or more teacher preparation courses to prepare the student to receive a teaching certification following graduation.
- C. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall develop formalized partnerships with public schools in this state to build commitments for teacher employment on completion of the Arizona teachers academy. The targeted deployment of teachers who have completed the academy shall be based on the needs of each school system and the community that is being served as well as the individual skills of each teacher.
- D. Each eligible postsecondary institution shall provide to each student who is enrolled in the Arizona teachers academy an annual scholarship up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of two academic years or four semesters for graduate university students, up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of four academic years or eight semesters for undergraduate university students, up to the actual cost of tuition and fees for a maximum of two academic years or four semesters for community college students for tuition and fees associated with the student's program of study, up to the actual cost of obtaining national board certification and renewal, and up to the actual cost of obtaining a teaching certificate including the actual cost of the exam, after all other financial gifts, aid or grants received by that student or teacher. Scholarships under this subsection are subject to all of the following:
- 1. If the student does not successfully complete the academic year 25 in good academic standing, the student shall reimburse the Arizona board 26 of regents for the total amount of the scholarship for tuition and fees 27 the student received for that year.
- 28 2. For each academic year that the student successfully completes 29 and for which the student receives a scholarship for all tuition and fees, 30 the student must agree to teach for one full school year in a public 31 school in this state. For students who are teaching and receiving the 32 scholarship concurrently, the commitment period begins after graduation 33 from the Arizona teachers academy. For teachers WHO ARE seeking a 34 national board certification, the teaching commitment is one additional 35 year after completing the requirements of the national board certification 36 program.
- 37 3. If a student enrolls in a summer term, that term may not be 38 included in the calculation of the student's postgraduation public service 39 commitment.
- 40 4. If the scholarship does not cover remaining tuition and fee 41 costs after other aid received, the eligible postsecondary institution may 42 not charge students the remaining difference. If the scholarship amount 43 exceeds tuition and fee costs at an eligible postsecondary institution, 44 the ELIGIBLE POSTSECONDARY institution may use the remaining amount to 45 support Arizona teachers academy costs.

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- 5. If the student does not fulfill the student's obligation to 2 teach in a public school, the student must reimburse the Arizona board of 3 regents for the proportional amount of the scholarship for tuition and 4 fees that the student received that corresponds to the number of school 5 years the student agreed to teach but did not teach in a public school in 6 this state.
- 6. If the student is physically or mentally unable to fulfill the 8 requirements of the Arizona teachers academy, the Arizona board of regents 9 shall establish a process for assessing the student's ability to repay the 10 financial assistance received and shall determine any terms of repayment.
- 7. The Arizona board of regents shall establish a process for 12 deferring service or repayment based on factors adopted by the board.
- E. The Arizona teachers academy fund is established consisting of 14 monies deposited pursuant to section 15-1281, subsection D, paragraph 5 15 AND SECTION 15-1809, SUBSECTION E and legislative appropriations made for 16 the purpose of administering the Arizona teachers academy. Monies in the 17 fund are continuously appropriated and are exempt from the provisions of 18 section 35-190 relating to the lapsing of appropriations. The Arizona 19 board of regents shall administer the fund and shall establish criteria 20 for distributing monies in the fund to eligible postsecondary institutions 21 each fiscal year to fund the costs of the academy. Monies in the fund may 22 be used only for:
- Reimbursing Arizona teachers academy scholarships that cover the 23 1. tuition and fees for undergraduate, 25 postbaccalaureate students WHO ARE enrolled in the Arizona teachers 26 academy after all other gifts and aid received.
- 27 2. Support for teachers who are currently employed in a public 28 school in this state and who are seeking a national board certification.
 - 3. Induction services for Arizona teachers academy graduates.
- Implementing a marketing and promotion plan to recruit and 31 retain students in the Arizona teachers academy with particular emphasis 32 on ensuring THAT participants reflect the diversity of the THIS state's 33 student population and administering the Arizona teachers academy. Annual 34 expenditures for marketing, promoting and administering the Arizona 35 teachers academy may not exceed three percent of the monies in the fund 36 each fiscal year.
- F. Monies remaining in the Arizona teachers academy fund at the end 38 of each fiscal year may be used by eligible postsecondary institutions for 39 Arizona teachers academy costs in the next fiscal year.
- G. On or before March 1, 2020 and each year thereafter, the Arizona 41 board of regents shall report to the joint legislative budget committee 42 and the governor's office of strategic planning and budgeting on all of 43 the following:

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- 1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers 2 academy by eligible postsecondary institution in the current academic 3 year.
- 4 2. The number of Arizona teachers academy graduates receiving 5 induction services in the current academic year.
- 6 3. The estimated amount of monies committed from the Arizona 7 teachers academy fund in the current fiscal year.
- 8 H. On or before September 1 each year, the Arizona board of regents 9 shall report to the governor, the president of the senate and the speaker 10 of the house of representatives, and shall submit a copy to the secretary 11 of state, on all of the following:
- 12 1. The total number of students enrolled in the Arizona teachers 13 academy at each eligible postsecondary institution by year of college 14 enrollment and the number of teachers receiving a scholarship through the 15 Arizona teachers academy for national board certification.
- 16 2. The percentage of students who completed each year of the 17 academy and who plan to continue to the subsequent year, delineated by 18 each teacher preparation program offered by each eligible postsecondary 19 institution as part of the Arizona teachers academy.
- 3. The number of teachers who completed a program of study through the Arizona teachers academy by each eligible postsecondary institution.
